DUBLIN, April 23.—(U. P.)—In a countrywide, one-day strike, the Irish leads plan an absolute stoppage of all public service, including the streetcars, newspapers and trains. This is to be done as a protest against conscription. Even the Irish Nationalists have decided to absent themselves from parliament.

NEW YORK, April 23.—(Special)—The United States marines have enlisted the services of Ben Franklin to aid in their recruiting campaign here.

The occasion warranted ceremony. Soldiers of the sea from the navy and a band paraded. Mayor Harlan spoke.

The marines did not doubt that the famous patriot would help their corps if he were alive. So without hesitancy they established a recruiting tent in front of the Franklin statue at Nassau street and Park row.

GERMAN TOWNS DISTURBED BY HEAVY LOSSES

THE HAGUE, April 23.—(U. P.)—The German provincial towns are greatly disturbed by the enormous casualties resulting from the west front offensive, it is learned here today. The papers are filled with the obituaries.

As an example, during the first five days of the offensive, the small frontier town of Bentheim had 67 dead and the town of Gronau had lost 27. Each city has a population of about 2,500.

LIBERTY BREADS

Barley Bread

One cup milk.
One teaspoon fat.
One and one-third teaspoon salt.
One-fourth to 1 cake of yeast.
Soak yeast in one-fourth cup lukewarm water, scald milk in double boiler and add fat. Let cool until lukewarm, add yeast and salt. Use from one-third to one-half barley flour and the remainder white flour. Make into sponge, allow to become light, add remaining flour. Proceed as for any light bread. Different dark breads may be made by following proportions:
One third barley flour, one-third buckwheat flour, one-third white flour; or one-third cornmeal, one-third barley flour, one-third white flour; or one-third cornmeal, one-third rye flour, one-third white flour; or one-third rice flour, one-third white flour, one-third buckwheat or barley flour.

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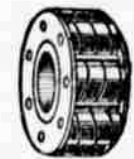
