A BIG ARMY

There is talk now at Washington of
an army of perhaps 5,000,000 men.
That is a far larger force than most
Americans have ever thought it would
be necessary for us to raise. But the
suggestion finds the public every-
where in an unusually receptive mood.

The national view has changed un-
der the pressure of this fierce strug-
gle in France and Flanders. We know
what the military experts have told
us all along, that it is no easy war,
that Germany is still amazingly
strong, that our allies have all they
can do merely to hold the enemy, and
that no small force of ours will suf-
fice to turn that tide.

The manpower of France and Brit-
ain, when this titanic battle is over,
will be sadly reduced. Their fighting
reserves will be nearly exhausted.
They will need time for recuperation.
They can squeeze out of their civilian
population only a few hundred thou-
sand more, at best. We can expect
little of Italy except to hold her own
line firm against Austria.

German manpower is no doubt as
near exhaustion as that of our allies,
perhaps more so. But we must bear
in mind this essential difference. Ger-
man manpower is in the hands of ir-
responsible autocrats, who are able
and willing to sacrifice it as the rul-
ers of our allied nations are not. The
Prussian ruling class cares not what
the human cost may be, if it can only
win. The French and British must
count the cost, and conserve men, be-
cause their commanders are men of
humane, and because their people
might not consent to such sacrifices
as the docile Germans endure.

We have faith that the wavering
tine of flesh and blood on which the
world's eyes are fixed will not break.
But we cannot expect to see that line
roll back toward the Rhine until we
ourselves are there in strength com-
mensurate with the size of the strug-
gle. We cannot beat Germany and
save civilization with our present
force in France, brave as it is. We
cannot do it with a million fighters.
Possibly we cannot do it with two mil-
lions, or three. We must take no
chances.

The obvious duty ahead of us is to
raise such an army as England raised,
to take her place in turn as she took
France's place. Our allies' role hence-
forth is to hold, with dogged perse-
verance, and teach us the game. Our
role is to get ready a huge military
battering ram while they hold, and
then smash through to victory.

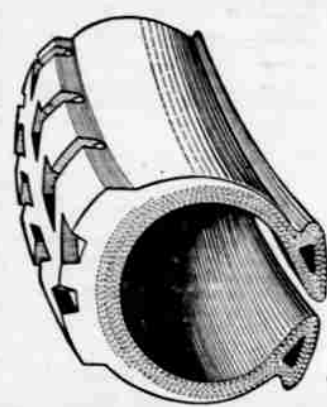

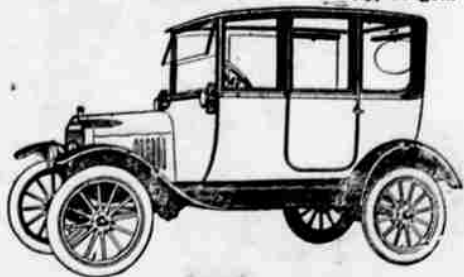
