1 1/2 c. cornmeal.
2 c. scalded milk.
1 yeastcake.
1 1/2 c. warm water.
1 c. flour.
4 t. fat, melted.
1 t. salt.
2 t. corn syrup.
4 or 5 c. flour (1 1/2 c. substitute.)
Procedure: Make first 5 ingredients into a sponge, let rise. All other ingredients, shape. Let rise again, and bake.
