WAR AGAINST SUBS SUCCESS

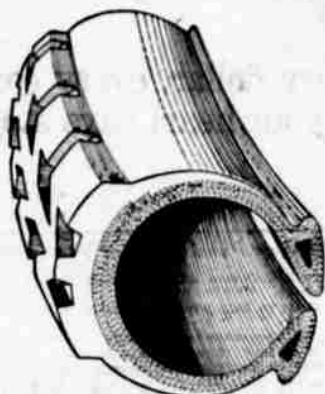

1 t. fat.
2 t. syrup.
2 eggs.
1 t. salt.
4 t. baking powder.
1 1/2 c. barley flour.
8-4 c. ground rolled oats.
Procedure: Mix liquid ingredients. Sift the salt, baking powder and flour together. Mix in the ground oats. Combine the two mixtures, stirring lightly. Bake in moderate oven.
