ent. Frank Miller also carried Albany, receiving 470 votes against 136 for Williams. In the county the same ratio was carried out, Cusick doubling the vote of his opponents and Miller securing 1900 to 700.

The postmortem on the county races shows that Albany failed to run true to form. Eastburn and Pierce were doped to carry Albany by substantial majorities, and both failed. Eastburn lost the city by 79 votes and Irvine beat Pierce by 19 votes.

Joe Frum also came to grief in Albany. In the county Kendall won by a majority of 383 and of this, 182 came from Albany. The vote for Warner was practically negligible in Albany. Fortmiller beat Fisher in Albany, having a majority of 86 votes, but lost over 200 votes throughout the county.

President Wilson Signs Bill for June 5th Re- istration

WASHINGTON, May 20.—(U.P.)—The supreme court today decided that the railroad employees dispatching trains or working in signal-tours cannot work more than nine hours out of every 24. The court refused to dissolve the United States Shoe Machinery company as a violator of the anti-trust laws.

President Wilson today signed the bill providing for the military registration of all men who have become 21 since June 5th. The registration on the coming 5th of June is now assured.

Mrs. Summers returned the last of the week from Seattle, where she attended the Red Cross convention. Over 500 delegates were in the session where they met personally the heads of the various departments and caught an inspiration for more careful and systematic work. Albany chapter's record is very high and the Linn county chapter name appears among the first in the roll of those whose shipments are up to standard.

Approximately \$7500 has been spent by the Red Cross chapter since the first of November for yarn, when Mr. W. B. Stevens began his work as purchasing agent.

The soldier off to camp finds that the telephone man has preceded him. It has been the telephone man's job to help make the camp ready for the soldiers. He has gone ahead with the contractors, installing temporary telephone equipment to facilitate the work of construction.
