Preserve Eggs

The government has issued a bulletin to the effect that it is patriotic and sane to preserve eggs. They suggest two ways to do it—one with silicate of soda (or water glass), the other with lime water.

The water must be boiled, then allowed to cool. Then add the water glass and stir thoroughly. Put in only clean eggs. If slightly soiled, wipe off dirt with cloth dampened with vinegar.

Stone Crocks

—are the best containers. 1 quart water glass, 9 quarts water will be sufficient for 15 dozen eggs. Use a 5-gallon jar. Keep jar well covered to prevent evaporation and keep in a cool place.
