REALLY A GOOD MOTOR

We need not feel so terribly disappointed about the Liberty Motor, after all. The Scientific American, whose word should carry authority, says:

"Speaking from firsthand knowledge, after a personal investigation by members of our staff conducted at Washington and Detroit, we are in position to say, first, that the Liberty Motor as it stands today as a distinct success; secondly, that its production in quantity has commenced and is proceeding at an accelerating rate; thirdly, that these motors as turned out by quantity-production methods are standing up to government tests; and lastly, that not only will our aviation service possess the lightest motor for its power, but a more powerful motor than any other in existence today."

That is reassuring. All we need now is to have the production multiplied.

MODEST GERMAN CLAIMS

Germany doesn't want much out of this war. Just a few trivial concessions. Here are the chief items, as set forth in a document found in a captured German trench:

Belgium is "to remain under German military, economic and political dependence."

German colonies are to be returned "with augmentation."

The great coal and iron districts of Northern France, grabbed by Germany in her first dash, are to be kept permanently.

The French frontiers are to be adjusted in other particulars, especially in the Vosges, so as to make them "easier of defense."

Russia's Baltic provinces are to be "incorporated," and a large section of Russia "colonized."

Roumania is to give Germany nearly all her petroleum output.

Germany is to have "more numerous and stronger naval stations."

"Liberty of the seas" is to be guaranteed by allowing Germany a commercial fleet of 17,800,000 tons, while all the allies together are to be restricted to 10,900,000 tons—about half of Great Britain's tonnage, and much less than we shall have at the close of the war.

"These nations who attacked peaceful Germany must pay all war charges in raw material, ships, ready money and territorial concessions, leaving Germany with only five billions (presumably of marks equal to one-fourth the same number of dollars) national debt."

So there we have the mild, generous terms on which Germany is willing to make peace. Nothing is said about limiting armies and navies.

Isn't it a delightful prospect?
