NOTICE TO WATER USERS

In order to provide the most satisfactory water service to users, the city is divided into two districts or sections, with the center of Ellsworth street as the dividing line. It is necessary and required that water users on the west side of Ellsworth street irrigate on the even dates of the month and that water users east of Ellsworth street irrigate on the odd dates of the month, provided, that when there are 31 days in any calendar month, all water users will be allowed to use water for lawn sprinkling and irrigation purposes on the 31st day thereof, excepting those who have violated the foregoing requirements made in the best interest of all concerned.
