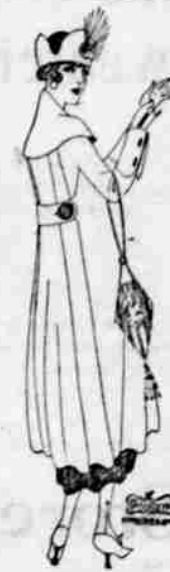

amount paid therefor. Partially used one-way tickets by charging tariff fares in effect at the time of purchase for journeys made. Mileage and excess baggage books by charging for portion used a net basis proportionate to that which would have applied had same been entirely used according to their contracts.

One-way tickets will be closely limited to time necessary to make continuous passage trip and will not allow stopovers or sidetrips.

Passengers traveling in sleeping and parlor cars will be required to pay additional charges, based on normal one-way fares, as follows: In standard sleeping cars and parlor cars, 16 2-3 per cent; in tourist sleeping cars, 8 1-3 per cent. These charges are in addition to the regular sleeping and parlor car fares.

The following minimum number of adult tickets will be required for occupancy of accommodations named in sleeping cars: for a drawing room or compartment, two tickets; for a section, one and one-half tickets.
