

AMERICANS REPULSE HUNS ALONG MARNE

MACHINE GUNNERS DEFEAT HUNS ATTEMPT-
ING TO CROSS RIVER AT CITY
OF CHATEAU THIERRY

BATTLE IS EXPECTED TO REOPEN SOON BUT
ODDS WILL FAVOR ALLIES IS BELIEF OF EXPERTS

Germans Apparently Make No Effort to Fortify Present
Line, and Are Believed to Plan Another
Big Offensive Move

FRENCH FRONT, June 6.—Fighting with machineguns
mounted in the windows of houses at Chateau Thierry, the
Americans today held the crossing at the Marne outshooting
and outgaming the enemy.

"This is the life," exclaimed one. "We had heard that
trench warfare was uninteresting but we have had the time
of our young lives recently."

Many of the American soldiers are green, but have shared
with the marines—veterans of many battles—the glory of the
three-day victorious but bitter battle.

The allies assumed the initiative on the Marne battlefield
last night, according to the French communique. The Ger-
mans were driven back at two points on the western por-
tion, losing 150 prisoners. Particularly sharp cannonad-
ing is reported on the west and eastern wings.

Despite the present stabilization of
the Marne battlefield from Chateau
Thierry to Noyon, there is no indica-
tion that the Germans are either en-
trenching or fortifying.

Apparently they have no intention
of resting at the present line. Conse-
quently the battle may resume with
increased intensity momentarily.

LONDON, June 6.—Marshal Haig
reported that German raids in various
points along the British front were
repulsed with loss to the enemy. Ar-
tillery fighting is active along the
whole front.

Enemy Attack Barred
PARIS, June 6.—The enemy now
finds his way barred by a line which
he cannot hope to break without the
aid of heavy artillery which he has not
had time to bring up.

Within a few days the present bat-
tle between the Marne and Aisne must
be expected to reopen with greater
violence than ever, but the odds will
favor the allies as the surprise ele-
ment is now past.

This will without doubt be the blood-
iest summer Europe has ever known.

W. S. S. MEETING IS HELD AT PICNIC

South Linn Workers Ready
for Drive to
Start

A meeting of the War Savings stamp
leaders in the south end of the county
was held at Brownville yesterday
morning, and the plans for the meet-
ing were discussed. There were 12
community chairmen present, and the
quotas for each town and community
were arranged.

Another meeting will be held for the
workers in the north end of the coun-
ty and, in a few days, the various
quotas will be made public. At pre-
sent, some of the smaller towns are
over rated while the larger are not
rated high enough, but this will be
remedied.

The meeting yesterday was a sur-
prise to the local leaders, who thought
the session was called for today. P.
A. Young, the county chairman, was
informed at 10 o'clock that the south
Linn chairmen were waiting at
Brownville, and in a little more than
a half-hour Mr. Young had collected
Postmaster Stewart and George San-
ders and had arrived in Brownville.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(U. P.)—
Senator Lewis precipitated a bitter
wrangle, charging that senators, by
the war's conduct in their hands, in-
vited the U-boats across the Atlantic.
Republican members resentfully
counter-attacked, charging that Lewis
"attempted to stop the submarine
by attacking the republicans."

ALLIES FAVOR NEW POLAND IS ANNOUNCEMENT

LONDON, June 6.—(U. P.)—
At an allied war council it is an-
nounced that the French, British
and Italian premiers have agreed
on the creation of a united and
independent Poland, with free ac-
cess to the sea, which shall be
the condition of a just peace.

The council also noticed with
pleasure Secretary Lansing's de-
claration favoring the nationalistic
aspirations of the Czechs and
Jugoslavs, it is announced.

CAMP LEWIS MEN TO STAGE HORSE AND MULE SHOW

CAMP LEWIS, June 6.—(Special)
—To show what proficiency has been
attained by army men in training the
horse and mule, to promote interest
among the men in their animals, to
raise money for an overseas athletic
fund and at the same time wipe out
the indebtedness of the Camp Lewis
athletic fund, the Remount Depart-
ment of the 91st Division at this can-
tonment will stage a great spectacu-
lar military horse show on Sunday af-
ternoon, June 16, in the big arena
which was constructed last year for
such events. Special interest centers
on this show because of the prospect
that the division will soon leave for
France.

The show has been approved and
sanctioned by the commanding offi-
cers, who have offered all animals and
equipment at their disposal, as well
as men, to participate. It will be in
charge of Captain J. W. Jackson, com-
manding the Remount Department,
where horses and mules are now be-
ing trained for war use.

The department has thousands of
animals to draw upon for this exhibi-
tion and the very finest in horsemanship
is promised, it being known that
some of the best riders in the world
are among the enlisted men in the
camp.

A great arena of five acres will
hold the show and this has seating
capacity for many thousands, including
an unlimited parking area for autos.

NEW OFFENSIVE MAY BE HERE

trol fought an hour with double
their number of Germans, and
only retired when their ammuni-
tion was exhausted.

Commencement exercises for the Al-
bany high school graduating class
were held yesterday evening at the
Methodist church, and diplomas were
given to the 53 members of the class.
In addition, the awards of the various
scholarships and prizes were announ-
ced.

The Willamette University scholar-
ship was awarded to Nathiel Donac.
The two Oregon Conference scholar-
ships went to Edward Umphrey and
Florence Ryder, and the Whitman col-
lege scholarship was given to Edmund
Way.

The Schmitt examination prize of
\$25 was won by Edward Umphrey.
The Lawrence Flynn prize was won
by Elma Cox, who won \$10, and Vera
Green was second, receiving a prize
of \$5. The E. F. Wiles manual train-
ing contest went to the Buchner twins,
Merle Buchner winning the first prize
of \$15 and Mertice Buchner the second
prize of \$10.

The prizes for the W. P. White Bi-
ble prize were not announced and the
winner has not yet been determined.

The 1918 class was the largest to
graduate from Albany high school and
contained the largest number of girls
and the smallest number of boys for
many years. There were 42 girls and
11 boys in the class.

An appropriate program was given
by the members of the class last night,
and the church was well filled with
relatives and friends of the class.

ception was a Greek, and as he was
registered at Mill City, he might have
stepped across the line into Marion
county.

Senator Garland Strong for Prohibition Law

State Senator Sam Garland of Leba-
non will support the National Prohibi-
tion amendment when the same is pre-
sented for ratification in the Oregon
legislature, according to a statement
given out to the Democrat today.

"The Oregonian recently stated that
I had declined to say as to what I
would do on the national prohibition
amendment if elected. This is a mis-
take. They never asked me as to my
position on this question. I favored
it four years ago and am very much
in favor of it now. The people of Linn
county need have no concern as to my
position on this question for I will give
an affirmative vote in favor of the
amendment."

Citizen Held Without Discharge From Army

Otto Miller, who has neither regis-
tration card nor discharge from the
army, is being held in Albany by the
local police. Miller claims to have
been discharged because of disability
from Camp Lewis, but has no papers
to show. Chief Catlin wired today to
the authorities and will hold the man
until word is received. Miller claims
he burned his card and papers after
leaving Tacoma.

votes for national committeeman and

7,702, giving Hornbrook a majority
of 2,439.

AN ENGLISH PORT, June 6.—(U.
P.)—The steamer Keniworth Castle
with 312 passengers arrived from a
South African port today in a dam-
aged condition. Either a submarine
attacked her or she struck a mine.

with a heavy object, and some of the
crew were drowned by rushing wa-
ter.

Notice of Next Draft Call Is Not Received

The local exemption board has not
received the official notice of the draft
—announced at Washington—for 2,000
men from Oregon. This, however, will
probably be received today.

The 61 men called yesterday
brought the list of those taken down to
114, and as the coming draft will prob-
ably require about 60 men from Linn
county it is probable that serial num-
bers up to about 1600 will be called.
This will leave but few more names
remaining in class one in the county.

Baker Asks for U-Boat Defenses

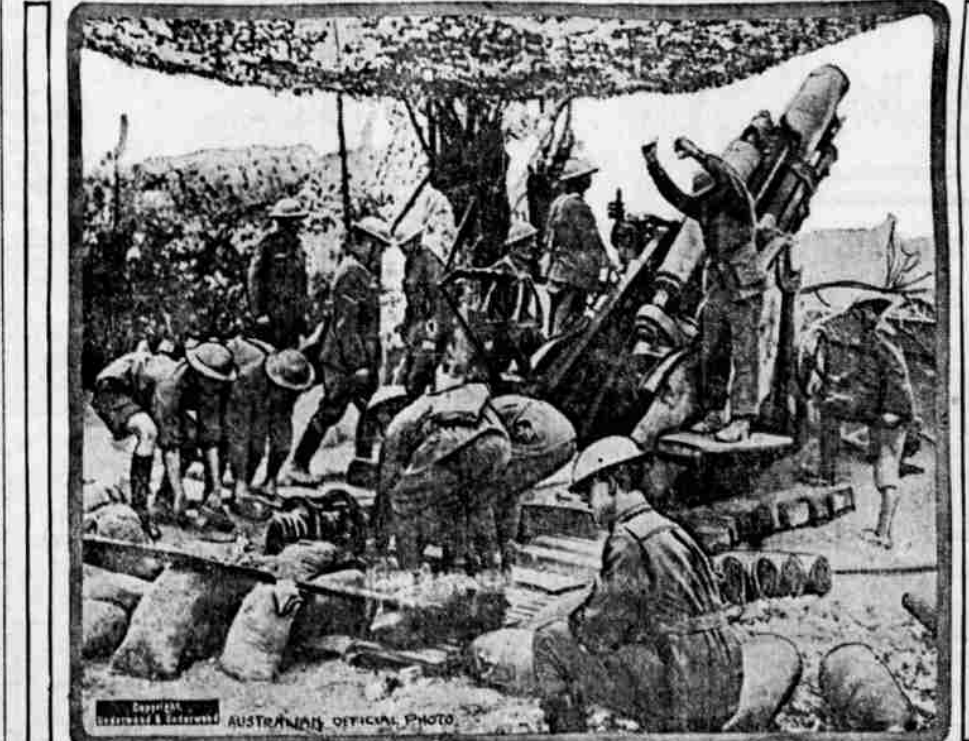
WASHINGTON, June 6.—(U. P.)—
