ged-off lands near Lakeview, Klamath Falls, on the Harney Plains and the Oregon-California grant; in fact, there are isolated tracts all over Oregon that should be more intensely settled and cultivated. Money should be provided so that the soldiers can acquire these lands from the state, the state being the purchaser at reasonable figures from the present owners, through the right of eminent domain if necessary, so that there will be no difficulty in the way of returning soldiers reaching the lands at once; buildings should be provided, the land sub-divided into proper tracts, stock and seed furnished if necessary, long term of years at a low rate of interest must be provided for repayment so that the young man, whom we hope will be yet full of years, will not regard it as a charity, but simply an opportunity provided by the grateful ones whom he has defended; and all of these colonizing tracts should not be confined to the far-off settlements or to tracts far removed from the centers of population. The best is none too good for those who suffered their all in our defense. No one who has remained 6,000 miles from the poisoned gas and shells and made large sums of money by reason of this gigantic struggle has a moral right to own large tracts of the choicest lands of Oregon when thousands of boys who have stood for months in the mud of Flanders are asking for a place to raise the things necessary to maintain themselves and those dependent upon them. We, the land owners of Oregon today, have no right to sit tight and refuse to help in the upbuilding of this state and in its reconstruction. We have no right to refuse a fair price for our land, or at least a part of our holdings if necessary, to promote the reconstruction of our country when the war is over.

"No one has a right to say, 'the state owes me a living,' for the state owes no man a living; but the state does owe to everyone a chance to earn a living.

"The National government should press to immediate completion every irrigation project in Oregon, including the great John Day project that may take 20 millions of dollars. An irrigation homestead should be provided by national law so that the returning sailor or soldier can have, if he wishes, 20 or 40 acres of irrigated land with water and title practically free. Nature has provided Oregon with some of the most beautiful, valuable streams on this globe and the possibilities for electrical development in Oregon are simply marvelous, the Columbia river, the mountain streams of the Cascades and other mountains, a steady flow of water throughout the year, dropping from immense heights. These great natural resources should be developed so that electrical energy might be for sale at a comparatively nominal rate for promotion of manufacturing industries.

"Let no thing the old order is going to be restored when the roar of cannon ceases on the Western front. Democracy and Christianity are going to win and when the men have won these great battles of physical endurance, they are going to win still greater battles in distributing more equitably the fruits of honest toil. In this golden time to come, not far removed, everyone is going to receive more nearly the full results of their toil and those that enjoy an abundance, the result of human toil, are going to more nearly earn that which they receive. The old order and plan of distribution will change, giving place to a newer and more equitable one. As 'mid the smoke of battle will perish the last stand of those who believe that 'might makes right,' so will be born on those same battlefields a new brotherhood of men that will reach to the farthest corners of this earth. 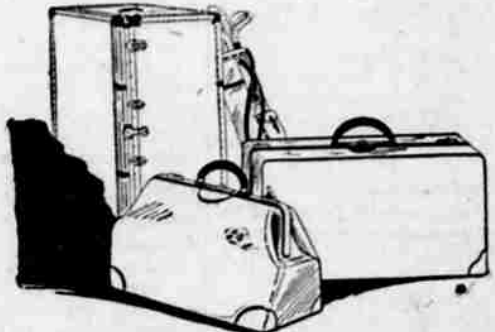
