EXPLANATION IS MADE BY COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT

I regret exceedingly that statements have been circulated that I made a pro-German address at Rock Hill schoolhouse, near Lebanon, on May 15.

It has caused me much pain because I am now and have always been opposed to the Kaiser and the Imperial autocratic government of Germany. As a native born citizen of the United States I am now and have always been loyal, and believe in upholding our government in all its departments, and especially in its prosecution of this war against Germany. I have given much time and money for the Red Cross, purchased Liberty Bonds and War Savings Stamps, and contributed to the limit of my financial resources.

I have worked loyally and zealously with the state authorities in all things to forward the work planned by the state and national administration. I have personally gone before the pupils and addressed practically every school in Linn county and urged the children to invest in Thrift and War Savings Stamps, and the fact that Linn county has been one of the leading counties in the purchase of the same is sufficient evidence that I have given this work my earnest and loyal support. In my address at Rock Hill it is claimed that I did not blame the Kaiser as I should have done, and that I inferred that the boys who played marbles for "keeps" are like the Kaiser. It was an illustration of what selfishness would lead to, that I made use of the language, and that playing games for "keeps" led to a spirit of gambling which I condemned. I blame the Kaiser for this unholy and horrible war, brought on by him because of his selfishness and greed to conquer the world, and I know of no one to whom he can be compared except Satan. I consider that all the murders and horrible destruction of lives and property which have occurred and are now occurring can be justly charged to the Kaiser, and it should be the endeavor of everyone who loves liberty to never cease work until he and his government are defeated. It has never been my intention at any time to express any sentiment other than loyalty to the United States, and I much deplore that the language used in my address has been so misconstrued. Any construction placed upon my remarks, imputing the slightest disloyalty, is based upon a misapprehension of the thought which I intended to convey. I submit that my remarks should be judged as a whole and not by any isolated statement. If I am accorded this common justice, no fair-minded person could question the loyalty of my address.
