BUSINESS MEN HARVEST POTATOES IN TEXAS

The potato crop of Houston and Wharton counties, Texas, has been saved through the aid of the business men in local towns. When it was realized that the potato crop would be lost unless the farmers received help the state extension director, cooperating with the farm help specialist of the department of agriculture, explained the situation, and the business men closed their offices and helped harvest the crop. Such cooperation is meaning much not only for the increasing of the food supply of the nation but in many cases has existed between town and country. Business men and farmers are working hand in hand to secure an adequate food supply and to further the nation's cause. Other communities are planning to follow the example set in these Texas counties.

POTATO BREAD

Potato Biscuit
2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons baking powder
3 tablespoons shortening
1 cup mashed potato
Liquid sufficient to mix
Sift together twice the flour, salt and baking powder. Cut or rub into this the cold shortening. In the same way rub into this flour mixture the mashed potato. Finally add just enough cold liquid to make the mass cling together. Do not knead. Place on floured board, roll until one-half inch thick and cut into rounds. Place these in lightly floured biscuit tins and bake 15 to 20 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Bake all potato breads more slowly than those made with flour alone.
