UNCONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS

Forty-five "conscientious objectors" in Texas have been sentenced to 25 years imprisonment for refusing to wear army uniforms.

This may be regarded as an extremely heavy penalty. It is not evident that it is heavier than the offenders deserved, considering the gravity of their offense. They were not asked to fight, contrary to their religious principles, but merely to engage in some form of noncombatant work. It was war work, to be sure, but what work today isn't? The mental perversion of these conscripted men appears, moreover, to have been aggravated by deliberate anti-war propaganda on their part. Thus mere passive resistance became active and intolerable interference with the national purpose.

The natural conclusion is that the offenders were in reality "unconscientious" objectors—that it was not principle but lack of principle that inspired them. Their fate will serve a useful purpose in deterring others from following their example as shirkers in a time of great need and traitors to a noble cause.

PAGANISM

It isn't only the Kaiser who claims the special favor of the Almighty in furtherance of German imperial ambitions. The same spirit has found striking expression among German religious leaders. Secretary of State Lansing, in a recent address, quoted the words of a well known German pastor to his congregation: "The German soul is God's soul, and it shall and will rule over mankind," and the other words of another doctor of divinity: "Verily, the Bible is our book. It was given and assigned to us, and in it we read the original text of our destiny, which proclaims to mankind salvation or disaster as we will it."

Commenting on the spirit of these utterances, Secretary Lansing says: "Paganism, tinged with modern materialism and a degenerate type of Christianity, broods today over Germany. Christian ministers have proclaimed Jehovah to be the national deity of the empire, a monopolized German God, who relies on the physical might of his people to destroy those who oppose his will as that will is interpreted by his chosen race. Thus the Prussian leaders would harmonize modern thought with their ancient religion of physical strength through brutalizing Christianity."
That explains present-day Germany pretty well—a religious nation, indeed, but a nation whose religion is still a brutal paganism, camouflaged with Hebrew words and Christian forms.
