P.)—President Carleton of the Western Union, in writing to President Wilson today, virtually declined to accept the ruling of the war labor board as the President requested unless forced to do so by the government. He declared that the board's findings were not binding because they were not unanimous. He declared that there is no danger of a telegrapher's strike.

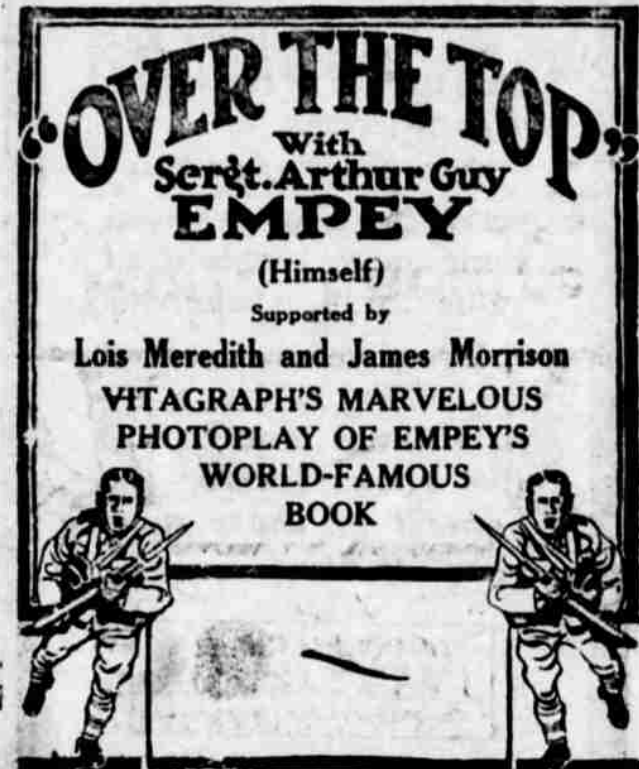
