EMPEY GIVEN OVATION AT ROLFE THEATER

Sergeant Arthur Gu Empey, hero of a hundred fights with the Hun, went "over the top" at the Rolfe Theater last night and with him went the sympathies and cheers of one of the largest audiences that ever was jammed into a local theater.
