FINANCIAL REPORT OF SCHOOL DISTRICT GOOD

The report on the auditing of the books of the Albany school district has been submitted by F. M. Redfield, the auditor, and shows that the total receipts of the district for the past year were \$76,491.46, of which \$2,992.19 were on hand last year. This income was derived from the state and county school taxes, bond interest and miscellaneous sources.

The disbursements totaled \$73,488.62, leaving a balance on hand of \$3,042.84, with vouchers outstanding totaling \$233.25. The expenses included \$33,473.57 for teachers' salaries, \$2,996.95 for the janitors, \$1,252.79 for fuel, \$348 for replacement and repair.
