Last year was the first meeting of this extraordinary rural Sunday school gathering. It was probably the largest open air meeting of its kind ever held in the county. Six hundred people participated in the gathering, and many of these reported it the "greatest day of its kind they had ever seen."

This year the meeting will be held on the last day of this month—Sunday, June 30th. It is under the auspices of the American Sunday School Union. The program will begin at 10:30 a. m. with song service accompanied by an orchestra.

The program will be varied and full of instruction and interest. Dinner will be served by the ladies from the baskets brought by the people.

One of the most valuable features of the day will be an address by Dr. W. P. White of this city on "Inspiration and Authority of Scripture Versus Hun False Philosophy and Theology." Dr. White will show the peril of Prussian Kultur and disclose the cause of the war. Last year the following rural Sunday schools attended in a body: Crowfoot, Fairview, Happy Home, Mt. 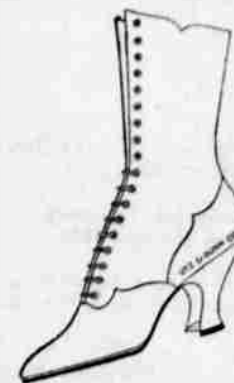
#### "THE SPLENDID SINNER"
