

WALTER PIERCE IS SPEAKER AT POMONA

Non-Political Address Delivered by Well Known Eastern Oregon Man Sunday

Hon. Walter M. Pierce was the principal speaker at Charity Grange, Linn county, Saturday afternoon, June 29, at an open meeting of Pomona. His subject was 'The Grange and the

War." He called attention to the fact that it was in grangehalls that the first great problems of economic legislation were discussed and worked into laws; 42 years ago this year occurred the financial crash of '73. The granges of the Middle West were active in helping to solve the problems of legislation, control of public utilities, etc. He called attention to the grange bills of Iowa that paved the way for the interstate commerce commission and all commissions of the sort; states that have fixed the charges for all public utilities. As the Grange has played so nobly its work in the past, not only in solving legislative matters but also in making farm life much lighter, assisting in wiping out much of the isolation and lonesomeness of the ordinary farm home. Now greater problems are just ahead. The war is taking our boys and girls faster than ever from the haunts of the old farm. When the cruel clouds roll by are they coming back to us or will they be so weaned from the old farm that they will never be contented again to take up the often humdrum life of the farmer. The close of the war means the opening of the greatest problem of all times. Our cities are sure to be full of men out of employment. We cannot have a large standing army. We must find ways to take back into the ordinary walks of life thousands that will find themselves out of employment. Our irrigated sections must by the government be prepared for the returning soldier boys. Logged off lands if suitable must be put into shape in proper tracts, credits arranged, money provided for buildings and seeds for the soldiers and sailors who have given months and years of the very best of their lives for \$1 a day will not have the financial ability to finance any sort of any agricultural en-

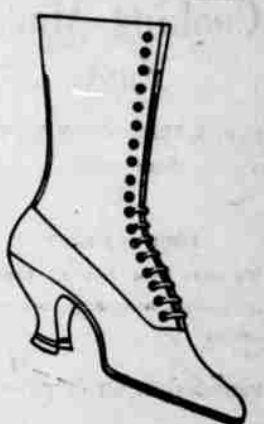
