things just now. Letters from you and dad and all the kids are reaching me regularly and are more than appreciated. Am also hearing from many friends.

Have not heard from Earl since he was over here but guess that he has written to our folks by now and gave you all details of his trip overseas. Will write him soon. Will also write my good friend Mayor Carl soon. Tell father to give him my best regards when he sees him again. Am glad Grace and Rodrick had a nice visit at home and had a chance to read my letters to you. Will send her a few lines in the near future. Recently received a nice letter from Uncle Joe and must answer it at once.

It is fine of you mother to write regularly to your four sons in the service and your letters are always eagerly awaited and are always most interesting. It must keep you on the go to write to us all—you and father both. I just hope that my letters reach you as regularly as yours do me. Apparently Helen and Chauncey are well and happy and getting along fine up there in Montana. Helen writes quite regularly and generally sends me newspaper clippings of interest. In her last letter she sent me a picture of Earl in naval attire, one of Walt, one of Glenn and one of her flock of chickens. All were snapshots and gave me no little pleasure in looking them over.

My Astoria friends write me that many of my letters to various people there have found their way into print and that all were much enjoyed. I always give them and you folks all I can without violating censorship regulations. Besides the Astoria and Albany newspapers, the Warrenton (Clatsop Co.) paper is also being sent me. So I get much of the home news. I just finished a 24-hour tour of guard duty—watching a picket line of nearly 200 horses belonging to our battery. All are first class American stock and far more intelligent than the French horses. I am partial to black horses and should be too I guess for they are the ones which belong to the section of which I am a member.

Father wrote that the Third Liberty Loan was heavily oversubscribed and that big crops are in sight. This news pleases all soldiers for it will be of material aid in winning the war for the allies. Tell Hazel Ewing that I sent my congratulations on the arrival of her young son. Guess her soldier-husband will be much pleased to know he has a son—for there's nothing like boys.

truth and righteousness, and Jesus Christ, the God-man and savior of the world.

In substance he said: "France once was largely an infidel nation, but under the scourge of war was grandly turning to God. America is more and more turning back to the faith of our fathers and founders of our Republic and is yet to be still more the beacon light nation of the world."

The last speaker was C. H. Walker, who made reference to some of the early Oregon pioneer history. About this time of the year, 30 years ago, his parents were well out on the overland journey to Oregon; for his mother in her diary, June 15, 1838, wrote of being on top of Independence Rock, a landmark well known to most Oregon immigrants. Many wrote their names on the rock. By special request Mr. Walker sang a Chinook jargon song, first explaining the origin of the odd-sounding language. The site of the picnic is a historic spot; a half-mile on the Lebanon Road from Harmony Grange hall on the Santiam Road. The shade comes from second-growth oak trees. Nearby is a deep pool of water, located in what was once the channel of the Santiam. C. S. Mullin, whose farm lies along the pool, relates that the old Indians told him that the above river flowed past this place.

A huge jam of trees, etc., near a mile long, formed across the channel and beyond and during very high water the river would sometimes overflow the farmlands to the west five or six feet deep. The present channel is to the east. In early days this pool was a great camping place for travelers going from the lower Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon on in a contrary direction. Sometimes flocks of sheep, herds of cattle, etc., would be corralled in the lane by putting a temporary fence across the two extremes of the lane.
