THE BATTLE CRY

In a recent battle south of the Som-
me, where Americans and Australians
won a smashing victory, correspond-
ents were particularly impressed with
two things—the spirit with which the
Americans fought, and the battery
they used.

It was the Americans' first appear-
ance in action. They had never seen
a frontline trench before. They were
young, unseasoned troops. Their con-
duct was instinctive and characteristic.
They charged the enemy with fixed
bayonets, shouting the word "Lusi-
tania!"

"Again and again," writes a corre-
spondent, "the Australians heard that
word on the Americans' lips as though
there was something in the sound of
it strengthening to their souls and
terrifying to the enemy. They might
well have been terrifying to any Ger-
man who heard that name, for to the
American soldier it is a call for ven-
geance."

It might be regarded as the battle
cry of the whole war, so far as Amer-
icans are concerned. It serves to re-
call the dastardly crime that first
shocked America into an understand-
ing of Prussianism and turned Amer-
ican sentiment distinctly against Ger-
many. To us it is a perpetual remind-
er of duty and a summons to our
fighting spirit.

To Germany it is the voice of doom.
For every American sent down with
the Lusitania a thousand Germans will
die from American bullets and at the
point of American bayonets.

WAR TAXES

The income taxes which we paid
without any disturbance to our bank-
ing system, and with comparatively
little inconvenience to our people,
amounted to somewhere near \$3,000,-
000,000. Our internal revenue collec-
tions for the last fiscal year were \$3,-
675,000,000. Our customs, postoffice
and other receipts swelled the figure
to a good deal more than \$4,000,000,-
000.

We have thus raised over four bil-
lions by taxation in one year. That is
enough to pay the interest on a na-
tional debt of a hundred billion dollars,
which is far more than any belliger-
ent yet owes or is likely to owe.

We can raise twice that much by
taxation without crippling our pro-
ductive industries, wrecking our banks
or suffering great personal hardships;
and we shall probably do so before the
war is over.

Suppose we do contribute the huge
sum of \$8,000,000,000 in cash to pay
current war expenses. That is not
more than one-sixth of our national
income. If necessary, we shall cheer-
fully pay one dollar out of every six
to win the war.

Most of the other belligerents are
paying more than that; and it comes
harder with them because they are
only making a dollar or two to our
six, and have much less left after pay-
ing their rockbottom living expenses.
