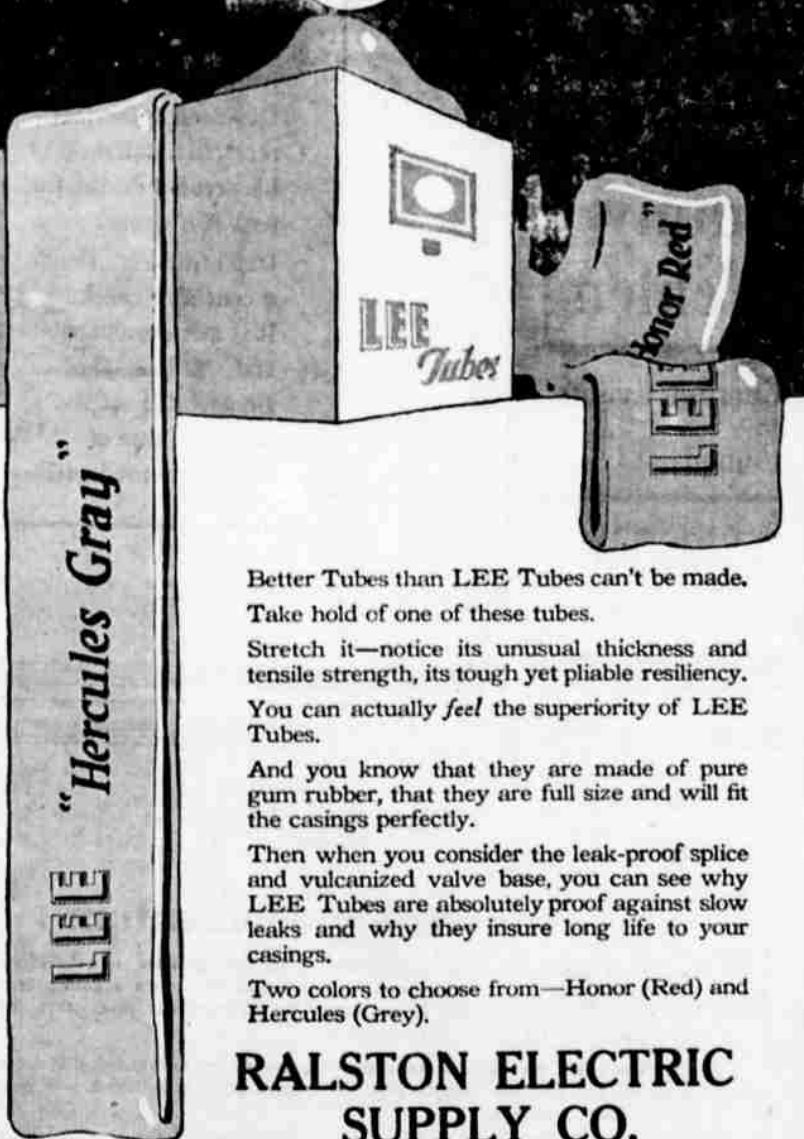

OBITUARY

Ellen Amelia Reasoner was born in Illinois September 1, 1843. Her parents were Rev. J. S. Reasoner and Tryphena Reasoner. She crossed the plains with her father's family in 1852 and spent the first winter at the present site of Portland.

She received her education at Albany college, Pacific University and Willamette University. She taught school for several years before going into the photograph business at Brownsville, where she married Wm. Hull in 1876.

They later went to Goldendale, Wash., and resided for five years.

They returned to Oregon and settled three and one-half miles north of Bellfountain in Benton Co., where they lived 36 years. The husband, five children and 11 grandchildren survive.

Mrs. Dr. E. W. Howard, Brownsville; Mrs. Winnie Springer, Portland; Wm. Hull Jr., Bellfountain; Mrs. Robert S. Smith, North Albany; Mrs. Ivan Hawley, Alpine. Besides, four brothers and three sisters: Dr. Frank Reasoner, Guinda, Cal.; Lucy Hawley, Cleveland; Mary Cole, Canby; Calvin Reasoner, Portland; Martha Stormont, Waller, Or.; Henry Reasoner, Bellfountain; and Rev. Froman Reasoner, Winters, California.

The deceased was operated on in Portland in November, 1916, for cancer and again June 1, 1918; but after the last operation she grew weaker and passed peacefully to her home above July 12th, at her daughter's in Brownsville.

Interment was in Bellfountain cemetery with Rev. M. M. Waltz officiating.
