the martyred President applies today to the lonely man in the White House. The eventful era has developed the masterful man. His great paper recently given to the World at Mt. Vernon has been printed and read in all civilized corners of the earth. He stands today the grandest, strongest, ablest man to appear upon the world's theater of action. His trained mind, his knowledge of history, his heart that beats in perfect unison with those who desire equal opportunities for all, make of him today without question the most conspicuous figure on the globe. Leading all of the down-trodden people of the world in this great world war against caste, class and special privilege, leading humanity out of the darkness and oppression into the light of real individual freedom, of real Christianity—Woodrow Wilson, the pride of these United States, the hope of the World!

Our picnic today is held in the center of what must soon become a great empire of prosperous, happy farmers' homes. The vast amount of individual effort as well as state and national aid put forth to make a success of these irrigated projects in Central Oregon should not, will not be lost.

Military training must become universal for our defense, but we must not maintain a large standing army that might become a menace to all free institutions. A homestead of 40 acres should be provided by the national government, with water and land free, for every honorably discharged soldier and sailor. Our country has demonstrated her strength—she will provide her sons, who have sacrificed so much, with land and will assist them in every way to make the same productive, that those who are dependent upon our heroes may have a home and all that name implies.

When the homesteader should prove his desire for a home by living upon these irrigated tracts for a term of years and improving them, then title should be granted. The healthful country home, with things growing, in all of nature's loveliness, will look better than anything else to the brave boys who have experienced that Hell on earth which the Hun has created in devastated France.

A score of times colonization schemes have failed because of the greed of many. Heartless promoters have fixed land prices so high, terms of payment so exacting, that failure was certain to follow. The state must step in between the greedy and the needy. Landowners should not forget that the war is creating new conditions. The boys returning from the fiery furnaces of Hell are not going to take their blankets and walk leisurely along our country roads and behold land not used; land in large tracts that the owner cannot use, and be law-abiding citizens very long.

Landowners should not forget that six years ago 40 per cent of the voters of this state voted to take the

value out of all land through the form of simple tax. I appeal to the landowners of Oregon to make a success of the colonization scheme as security for themselves. The old order is not going to be restored. Growers of wheat are going to ask that if the board of trade in Chicago can be prohibited from trading in wheat in war times, why can this not be done in times of peace? Indeed, the war has taught the wheatraiser that it is not necessary to have a bunch of wheat gamblers in Chicago fixing the price of their product.

What a frantic effort the big packers are making today through large display advertisements in papers and magazines, to show that they are not profiteers and that the charge made by the Federal Trades Commission, that they have extracted 141 millions from the producers and consumers, is only fair. Read their advertisements and then think of the untold millions that in a brief generation these packers have taken as their margin of profit. We people, who have raised hogs and cattle by thousands, know that the packers have compelled us to market our fat cattle and hogs at prices year after year that have left practically no profit to the producer. They are profiteers and enemies of the new order that will more equitably distribute the fruits of honest toil.

In the grand, bright day, the light of which is now breaking on the battlefields of Europe, woman will play a more leading part than ever before in the affairs of humanity. It has been a long, hard struggle, centuries old, for woman to rise to her present position. Through the many centuries, since Joan of Arc led the frightened French soldiers to victory, that spirit has pointed the way to woman's proper sphere in the affairs of the world. Anglo-Saxon civilization has been the defender, the promoter of woman. In the American colonies at an early day her advice was often sought and followed.

In the present titanic struggle how marvelously woman has played her part, with heavy heart bidding goodbye to son or husband, she has taken up the burdens of life with new vigor, not only in America but in Europe. It is her spirit, her sacrifice that has held up the morale of mankind.

In the golden day for humanity, rural life will become the real center. Good roads, perfect roads; and the modern automobile has eliminated the isolation of the country home, and with all the modern comforts and conveniences the country home will become the ideal.

The weakness of Germany today is her voiceless and choiceless womanhood. The American boys will win on European battlefields on account of the strength of womanhood in America. The solutions of the problems following this war, colossal and far-reaching in their consequences, will be in a large part solved by our womanhood, now the recognized added strength to the intelligence of the

world. When the women of Rome were asked to bring their jewels as their offering to the government, the Roman matron Cornelia, having none, brought her sons as her offering and said: "These are my jewels." So, American womanhood has today placed her sons upon the altar of democracy.
