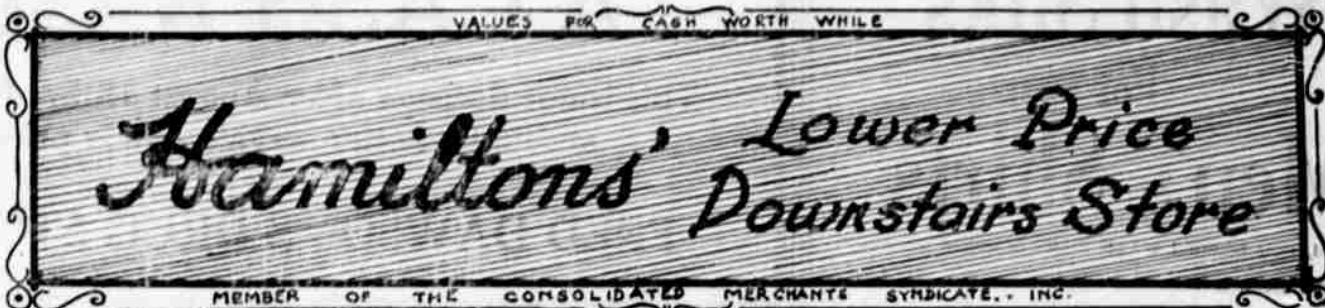
Returned Home— Miss Ella Struckmeyer returned home last night from a visit with relatives in Portland and Washington.

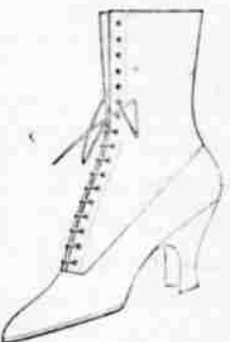

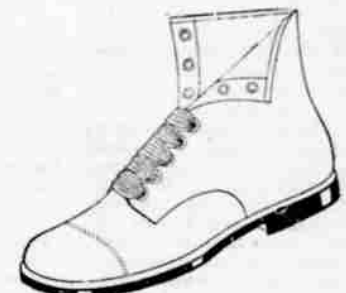

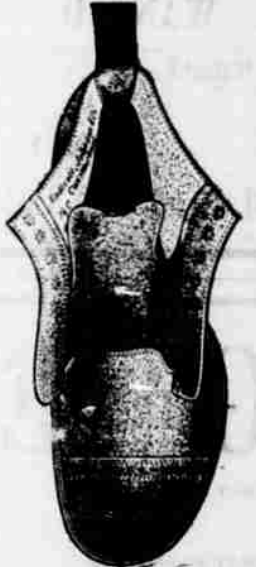
