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THE RUSSIAN FRONT

"If Germany is allowed to realize
her eastern program," writes Maj.
Gen. Sir Frederic Maurice, British
military critic, "she will come out of
the war relatively stronger than she
entered it, and will remain as great a
menace to Europe as ever."

He points out that Germany's policy
from now on will be to consolidate her
gains politically in the east. We may
expect her to fall back, little by little
on the western front, as the allied
pressure becomes greater. She will
devastate France as she goes, after
her usual manner. She will hold Bel-
gium as a pawn in the game. Even-
tually we may expect a flat offer to
stop the devastation and give up both
France and Belgium in exchange for
a free hand in Russia.

Whether she can succeed in that de-
pends on whether the allies can break
her resistance in the west. And that
depends, according to the view of Gen.
Maurice and many other observers,
on whether her power is first broken
in the east. For if Germany ever
succeeds in organizing and mobilizing
Russian manpower for her own mili-
tary purposes, our task will become
incomparably harder.

It is well, therefore, that steps are
at last being taken to checkmate the
Prussian campaign in Russia and Si-
beria. The allies have agreed on a
policy. We have already landed some
troops on the Murman coast, on the
Arctic Sea. There is more impressive
action at the other end of the great
empire. An expedition of Americans,
Chinese, Japanese, British and French
is expected to penetrate Siberia from
Vladivostok, to cooperate with the
wonderful little Czech-Slovak army
that already controls so large a part
of the trans-Siberian railway. That
force should be able to seize and hold
Siberia for the allies, and from that
vantage point to carry the war into
Russia from the east, weakening the
power of the Bolsheviks, rallying the
Russian people to effective resistance
and eventually driving out the Ger-
man invaders.

There is nothing visionary about this
plan. Conditions are ripe for it, with
the Russian millions already begin-
ning to revolt, and Bolshevik and
Prussian power alike tottering. It is
time to strike. With hard blows and
good luck, the Kaiser's devastating
hordes may be rolled back on Ger-
many from both fronts, and the fu-
ture safety of the world assured.

CHINA'S THOROUGH JOB

It may take a long time for China
to wake up to a modern need. But
when it does wake up, it is likely to
surprise Occidentals with its thor-
oughness. For example—

Announcement has been made that
the Chinese government has decided
to deport all Germans. It is going to
send from 7,000 to 10,000 persons to
be interned in Australia until the end
of the war. Most of these are busi-
nessmen. They are merchants, men
connected with shipping and banking
and all the rest of the businesses by
which Germany was trying to build
up her great foreign trade. The fab-
ric of this German business in China
will be reduced to ruins by this act.

It is to be noted that there is to be
no long-suffering patience, no expen-
sive secret-service work, as in this
country, no waiting until a man actu-
ally proves himself disloyal before
action is taken. A clean sweep is to
be made of all Germans in China.

Our method may suit our ideals of
justice better, our principle, that a
man is innocent until proven guilty.
But the Chinese plan has much to re-
commend it as an emergency measure
in perilous times.
