ent" from among the soldiers themselves. In preparation for these soldier-shows the Y. M. C. A. recently sent to France 15 trunks of costumes and make-up materials, thousands of playbooks and quantities of musical instruments. Troupes from different companies frequently "go on the road" so that a particularly good soldier performance may be put on in several camps.

The amateur-show is lots of fun. Participants are usually selected from "stunt night" performances. Then the play is chosen and the actors get busy on rehearsals in their spare mo-
