tions now—and obey them.

Lights are extinguished each evening along about 9:30 with the exception of a few blue-globed street arcs scattered along the boulevards and avenues. These give out a pale blue light that only illuminates the sidewalks for a short ways and cannot be seen by aeroplanes. The people throng the streets between 5 and 9:30 each evening, generally disappearing magically soon after the lights are extinguished. Abris, or places of refuge, are located all over the city, each holding a certain quota of people. In these places the populace dashes pell-mell when the sirens warn of the presence of hostile planes above the city. There have been no raids since I came here. I don't mind bombs and shells but when it comes to gas I want to be warned in advance of its coming. Automobiles are practically nil here now, only those of the military the municipal omnibuses, and trucks being in evidence. This is because petrol costs more than owners of cars can afford to pay, and because the French government has limited motorcar use in this country.

I am staying at the Grand Hotel du Pavillon, where one of the several large American Y. M. C. A.'s is located, and where soldiers in the city on leave and those stationed here, are quartered. Have a comfortable spring bed with sheets and pillow. Maybe you think it wasn't fine to "hit the hay" the day I arrived here, after a strenuous trip by road and train the day before. The train which put me in Paris on July 4 was crowded to the doors the night I boarded it, compelling me to stand up in the vestibule for eight hours. I took a bath yesterday and it sure went fine. This week was the first time that I had all my clothes off in more than two months! You can imagine about how I looked when I reached here.

The officers in charge of the Stars and Stripes were very kind and gave me clean clothing, had my baggage taken from the Gare de Lyon to the hotel, and gave me ample opportunity to clean up and rest a bit. I shall always remember their good treatment of me. I certainly appreciated it too. Mother, for, in French, I was "hacoo fatigue," meaning very tired. Met another officer I knew several years ago as Sergeant B. C. Hampton, at Fort Stevens. He is now a first lieutenant, National Army, and stationed near here. We had an enjoyable chat before he returned to camp.

How are you, Father and the children these summer days? All well, I hope. Would like to be there and eat some Royal Anne cherries or vegetables from the home garden. Speaking of Anne—I take my meals at the Hotel St. Ann, located on a street bearing the same name. Am trying to get the names of streets, avenues and boulevards memorized so that I can find my way about easily. I have already found that there are streets and boulevards located near each other, having the same name. Also that one long boulevard may carry several titles.

Paris is certainly the style show of the world as indicated by the wonderful displays in the windows and by the crowds of fashionably dressed people on the streets. The window displays are most interesting to me, for no matter what is shown, it is distinctly Parisian, or I might say, European—and quite different from American goods. They have some wonderful stores and shops here.

Friday night at the Hotel Pavillon we had a dandy concert by one of the American regimental bands and last night an excellent program was given there which included a play with American talent. It was very much appreciated by all the fellows. Am going to send you some of the newspapers of July 4 and since in order that you can better appreciate what is happening in Paris and other parts of Europe.
