WAR TO END IN 1919

SAYS COLONEL MAY

Commander of Old 3d Oregon Writes
Interesting Letter to Dr.
M. H. Ellis

The following letter was received today by Dr. M. H. Ellis from Colonel May, commander of the old Third Oregon regiment, which is now on the firing line in France:

Contraire L'air-Cher, France, July 27, 1918.

Dear Colonel: Your letter reached me today and I was very glad to hear from you. Also appreciate the spirit in which it was written. It is rather lonely over here and while a regimental commander has work enough to fill the 24 hours, it leaves a quiet hour or so when the mind will refuse to concentrate on the present and wanders back to other days and other wars. I often think of the days when the regiment was in the Philippines and of the staunch old comrades who in field and camp learned the lessons of war and were ever ready to lend a hand to help and a word to cheer. Only the chaplain and myself are left of the old commissioned personnel.

However, we have developed a fine lot of youngsters from the same material and the regiment maintains all its traditions. There is a wrong impression about the present status of the regiment. It is not "broken up" but is just as much an entity as the day it went into federal service. Has twice

as many Oregonians in it as it had on March 26th, 1917, and will always be officially the 162d (3d Oregon) Infantry. There has been and will be a great many changes in its personnel, but the same training that made the regiment what it was when it landed in France is still being given the men who join and the "esprit" of the 162d is still maintained. We have to take a big view of things over here and feel that we are doing our full duty when we do what we are ordered to do. "A soldier don't choose—he obeys." Nobody is downhearted and we are all "doing our darndest."

I think your diagnosis is correct, 1919 will see the end. I see Winn frequently. He is just the same. Write me when you find time and I want to assure you that the spirit of the army in France is one of absolute confidence. As to victory, we have met the Hun and he is not so "awful much." His "frightfulness" don't frighten the Yankee a little bit.

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock P. M., August 28, 1918, for the construction of an eight-inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in the Oak Street Trunk Sewer between First and Second Streets and running thence westerly into Block 7 in Hackleman's 3rd Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon, a distance of 272 feet.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of said City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer now on file in the office of the Recorder of said City, where the plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock P. M., August 28, 1918.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to 50 per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract for the faithful performance thereof, and within ten days after notification of awarding of such contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of October, 1918, under a liquidated penalty of \$10.00 per day for each day of delay beyond that period.

CANADIAN VETERAN TO SPEAK AT ROLFE

Lieut. J. A. Gallagher, who speaks at the Rolfe next Sunday and Monday, has a very thrilling story to tell his hearers.

Since coming to the states he has spoken to very large audiences. In Portland he spoke to 14,000 people and to 2,000 in Salem.

As a speaker he has the reputation of holding his audience from the moment he steps upon the stage.

He tells his story in a modest way, avoiding at all times to bring himself forward as a hero. He possesses a strong sense of "trench humor" which draws a smile even with its grimness, and does not harrow his listeners with gruesome details.

The lieutenant enlisted early in the war as a private in the Canadian mounted troops. He went to France early in 1915 and was there for the second battle of Ypres. After serving for a year as private he was promoted to first lieutenant for gallantry. Shortly after this he was gassed by a shell, but was back in the fight within a month. He went to Vimy Ridge with the Canadians and while there he was blown up by a shell, which resulted in a fractured skull. He was

sent through the usual chain of hospitals to England but on his way across he happened to be on board the ill-fated hospital ship Lanranc which was sunk in the channel on April 17, 1917.

There were 300 British on board and

150 wounded German prisoners. Thirty of the British and 60 of the Germans were lost in the catastrophe. The lieutenant's story deals mostly with his experiences from the time he was wounded until the time the Lanranc was sunk.
