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GENERAL MARCH'S PROGRAM

"It is up to us to win the war, and we can win it. How long it will take will depend exactly upon what we do. If we drag along with this thing and put a small force over there we will be playing Germany's game. It is my belief that with an American army of 4,000,000 men in France we can go through the German line wherever we please."

Thus Peyton C. March, chief of staff of the United States army, sets forth his conviction, and that of the government which he serves, in regard to the situation overseas. He has told congress what the government desires in the way of a vote of manpower. Congress knows that the American people stand ready to give all the government asks.

They are talking of extending the draft ages, nowadays in Washington, and of heavier taxes, and of the largest of all Liberty Loans. These things seem to worry congress, if reports of committee meetings may be trusted. There is no evidence available which indicates that they worry the people of the United States.

It took America a year before the nation was able to make its weight felt upon the European battle line, but today the people are as ready as the army.

The extension of draft age limits will bring no complaints. There will be no protests over heavier taxes. The nation is ready and well able to over-subscribe the Fourth Liberty Loan and such as shall come after. America is a peace-loving nation, and it desires peace so ardently that it will fight for it with all its power.

MR. AND MRS. RED CROSS

The stories of the refugees from districts invaded by the Hun in France and Belgium have a peculiarly human appeal. So many of these wanderers are the very old or very young, people to whom the war is just a shuddering horror in which they have no part but that of suffering.

The Red Cross in the war zone early organized an emergency refugee war service to meet the needs of these homeless, saddened people. The German drives last spring through the reconstructed region of the Somme sent many of these unhappy folk upon their second flight. The drive toward Paris in the fertile Soissons-Rheims salient—now once more rid of the enemy—sent a great stream of refugees into the capital. They needed food, shelter, clothing, hospital care and, most of all, human comfort. One little girl whose mother had been killed by the same bomb that had torn the child's face with shrapnel was given a doll. It soothed her and gave her something to love and cling to as she fell asleep.

The stream of these refugees flooded Paris for two weeks. Red Cross workers, men and women, cooperating with local police, worked with them every minute. As many as possible were sent into the southern provinces to work and live until their own country can be reopened to them, their own homes rebuilt.

How the refugees look upon their Red Cross friends is revealed in the message scrawled on a postal card and sent to "Monsieur and Madame the Red Cross."

This little note reads: "Dear Sir and Madame: I wish to thank you from my heart for everything you have done for us. One has been so well received everywhere and wherever one goes one will proclaim about the praises of Mr. and Mrs. Red Cross."

Is the work worth doing? Is the little money we take from our incomes to give to the Red Cross well-spent?
