Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock P. M., August 28, 1918, for the construction of an eight-inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in the Oak Street Trunk Sewer between First and Second Streets and running thence westerly into Block 7 in Hackleman's 3rd Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon, a distance of 272 feet.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of said City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer now on file in the office of the Recorder of said City, where the plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock P. M., August 28, 1918.
No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to 50 per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract for the faithful performance thereof, and within ten days after notification of awarding of such contract to such bidder.
