Holley Reed Bennett Writes From France

Rev. and Mrs. Bennett received the following from their son, Holley Reed Bennett, from France. He is with the Meteorological Division, U. S. Signal Corps:

Sunday, July 21, 1918.

Dear mother, I'm not at all certain that I shall keep up the letter-a-week average which some of the men set, but will not break it this time. Writing letters, you know, that are to be censored is a bit tedious, as one never is exactly certain just what will get by; it's something like breathing through a gasmask. At best a fellow feels a bit cramped.

I can't tell you much of anything about what I'm doing here. In one of my last letters from Fort Wood I told

you, I believe, something of what we thought to be the prospects of one kind and another ahead of us; this turns out to have been largely incorrect. The work is partly similar, in a general way, to what I did in Indpls., and partly of the other sort which I had spoken. Some of the men will eventually go to the front, I suppose, others will not.
