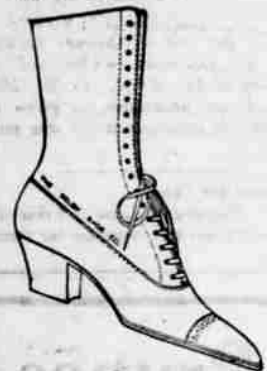

ROY KNOX CITED FOR PERSHING'S HEADQUARTERS

A. E. F., August 4, 1918.

Dear Mr. Johnson: Intended to reply to your nice long letter before, but it is the same old excuse of being very busy. I am more pleased than I have been since I landed in France. Tomorrow I start across

I be sent for work that I was especially qualified for, but I am afraid they are flattering me. But anyway, they know there is such a person in France, which is gratifying. I do not know what the nature of my work will be but I do not think it can be quite as trying as the work I am doing now. Will be in Paris Tuesday, and expect to be able to tell you of air raids or something else of interest in my next letter. Have moved since last writing but only about 50 miles. The altitude is about 3,000 feet and nights are quite cool. Lt. Alvin Baker is up on the line during the present drive, and have heard rumors that he has been cited for the Croix de Guerre. I hope the rumor is correct. Baker is a good officer. Collins is off at another school, and making good.

Saw Ernest Kutsch, the first time since leaving him in San Francisco with the measles. He has been knocking around over France but finally got back with his regiment. He tells me his grandfather is very low. I was very sorry to hear it. I like the old gentleman very much. The boys from Albany are all in the best of health. Van Wieder has got back with the regiment. He was also left behind in the states when we left. I made the trip from "Pierre Buffiere" in my machine. It was the most beautiful ride I have ever had, and I have been over quite a bit of this part of the country by automobile. Excellent roads and a fine way of seeing the country. The farming is being done entirely by women and oxen, most of it being very crude by the side of American methods. This is a great training center I am now in. Numerous troops, of both field and heavy artillery, and some cavalry. The regiment is making rapid progress and expects to be up on the line soon. I am sorry to sever my connections with the 65th, as I have some mighty good friends among the officers, and
