Oregon Power Company to Discontinue Giving Discount

The Oregon Power company announces that, commencing September 1st, the discount which up to this time has been allowed for prompt payment of electric light and power bills, will be discontinued. The company in common with everyone else is struggling with increased expenses. Wages, salaries and all other operating expenses have increased at a very heavy rate and the company has for some time contemplated an increase in rates. This they hope to avoid. The cost of labor and material has increased during the past five or ten years, but the company has reduced its rates during this period so that everyone could use electricity. The expenses of the company have suddenly increased. A small part of the increased expenses can be met by discontinuing this discount and the company proposes to try this before asking for an increase, which they hope will not be necessary.

BROADWAY THEATER OFFERS NEW FILM

The opening performance of "Tarzan of the Apes" was given last night at the Broadway Theater before an enthusiastic audience. The house was packed to the doors and hundreds of late comers were turned away. If the first night reception is indicative of the public's attitude toward the play, the feature is indisputably scheduled for a long and successful run.

The story takes the form of a jungle melodrama, in which every possible variety of thrill is crowded into a Robinson Crusoe setting. It follows the adventures of a youth who, when a baby, is stolen from his mother by a huge ape and brought up in the latter's native haunts. The boy

is really the son of a nobleman in England, and a faithful servant who has escaped from a band of Arab slavers, returns and endeavors to restore him to his rightful position as peer of a wealthy estate.

He is foiled at every turn by the son of a barmaid, the false heir to the title, who is finally reduced to defeat.

Meanwhile the real heir is still in the jungle where he spends his time getting the rescuing parties, sent for his benefit, out of their difficulties. In one of these fights with the en-

tire jungle, he saves a beautiful maiden from a ferocious lion and a charming jungle romance quickly develops. The last reel closes with a sentimental fadeout in which the unwitting heir finds that ignorance is bliss and that there are many other compensations for a title and estate in England.
