THE LANE PLAN

When peace is declared an army of between two and four million men will be disbanded and must be assimilated by the business or agricultural interests of the nation. What is the gov-ernment of the United States doing working out a solution for the problem of existence which will confront many of the returned soldiers when they are released from active duty abroad? The answer is found in the proposal made by Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane.

Secretary Lane has presented to the President a comprehensive plan for a preliminary study of the unused lands of the country which contemplates making available for American soldiers and sailors some 285,000,000 acres of arid, swamp and logged-off land. Government aid in reclaiming this waste land is proposed, and when finally made capable of producing a livlihood will be turned over to the returned soldiers under terms and conditions which will permit them to obtain a competence for old age.

Secretary Lane's proposal shows genuine desire on the part of the administration to commence now upor the important task of working out the problems which will confront the nation during the important reconstruction period after the conclusion of peace. No time should be lost in putting to a practical test the suggestion of the able and farseeing cabinet men

TWO WAYS

Military police would then have patrolled all the streets and highways, ready to pounce upon offenders. So the German people would have obeyedthrough fear.

In America, a simple request is is sued by the fuel administration. And all over the vast area involved, the people cheerfully acquiesce of their own free will. Wherever there is any forgetfulness or tendency to ignore the request, public opinion enforces i as effectively as governmental power could do.

It is another striking exemplifica tion of the essential difference between the two countries. In one the government rules by force. In the other the people rule by the power of public opinion.
