REDEEMING PALESTINE

Early in September the Turkish govern-
ment was engaged in negotiations
with German and Austrian Jews to
settle the fate of Palestine. The Jewish
leaders of Central Europe, working
evidently in harmony with the German
and Austrian governments, were net-
ting on the Turkish proposals for the
establishment of an "almost auton-
omous" Hebrew state.

Now that fine little scheme is
knocked in the head by the spectacular
resumption of British progress in Pa-
lestine. It is Gen. Allenby, not the
Sultan or the Kaiser, that will deter-
mine Palestine's fate. It is the en-
lightened Jews of the allied countries,
not those of Central Europe, whose
wishes will be considered.

The British government has for
some time been engaged in a compre-
hensive plan for the establishment of
an independent Jewish republic, the
restoration of the Holy Land and the
realization of Zionist hopes. That
plan is near consummation. There
can be no question that the tyrannous
and stupid Turkish rule over long sub-
jected but superior races is going to
be abolished for good by the triumph
of allied arms.

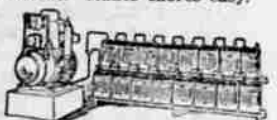
Turkish collapse is probably nearer
than most persons imagine, and the
hopes of Jews, Arabs, Armenians and
Greeks rise accordingly. There is
particular interest in the Jewish out-
look, because of its religious and his-
torical significance.

Always in the past the Turks and
the Germans have blighted the hopes
of Zion. Henceforth they will be pow-
erless.

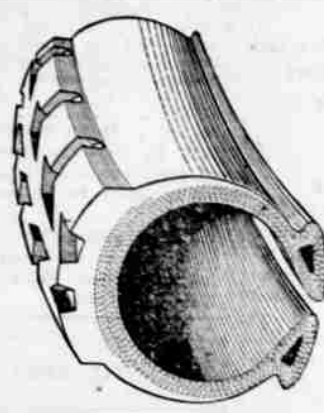
