A WORLD SENSATION

Our Fourth Liberty Loan has been
characterized as "nothing less than a
world sensation." It is in the German
Empire that the progress of this huge
loan will be watched with greatest
wonder. In Germany, too, its success
will effect almost as important a de-
feat as will the guns and shells pur-
chased by its dollars.

The German people have learned h
ow to raise \$3,000,000,000 loans. Eight
times, with great effort, they have met
their government's call for funds. And
it will seem unbelievable to them that
any nation can easily raise double the
amount of their standardized loans.

Suppose German newspapers could
truthfully print such headlines as
these: AMERICAN PEOPLE FAIL
TO SUPPORT GOVERNMENT, or
AMERICA CANNOT RAISE THE
MONEY TO FINANCE THE WAR.
German hope would soar; personal
hardships, hunger, lack of many of the
necessaries of life, would seem noth-
ing. They would imagine victory
close at hand and would unite with a
new thrill of exultation to strike hard-
er on the battlefield. Our failure in
this loan would prolong the war, cost
us more precious lives and countless
more sacrifices, simply because it
would restore to the Germans that
dwindling essential of the will to win,
the element of hope.

On the other hand, the success of
our loan is going to do just the op-
posite thing. It is going to increase
German doubts in their own ability,
it is going to create that dark despair
that weakens morale and lends speed-
ily to downfall.

Let us make this world sensation of
ours such a huge success that the
blindest German cannot fail to read
its meaning and quake at the doom it
spells.

OUR ANSWER

America's answer to all the preten-
tions of Kaiserism and autocracy, and
particularly to Germany's recent
plaintive peace offer, will resound to-
day through the voice of our subscrip-
tions to the Fourth Liberty Loan.

The full-throated roar of it will
echo throughout the length and
breadth of Kaiserdom and give fresh
reminder of the terrible mightiness
of right; will give renewed warning
of the vengeance that will be meted
out for the crimes and bestiality that
were mere incidents, the German
thought, of his climb onto the throne
of world rule; will deepen his gloom
at the prospect of relinquishing the
half of Russia he has stolen.

It is particularly appropriate that
the United States should at this time
have opportunity to pledge its faith to
its allies. Our soldiers have thrilled
them with their valor. It remains
only for America-at-home to record its
self unambiguously as determined to
carry on the war until the Kaiser
chokes on the bitterest drops of abso-
lute defeat.

It is further appropriate because at
this time Germany is floating her
ninth war loan. In proportion to its
national wealth, 80 billion dollars as
compared to the United States \$250-
000,000,000, Germany's success in fi-
nancing its war costs have been sur-
prising in their apparent success.
Economists point out, however, that
their scheme of financing has been
unsound to the point of frenzied fi-
nance. She has approached close to,
if not put into actual effect, con-
scription and confiscation of wealth.

Whatever figures Germany may be
able to announce as the result of its
loan, the mere subscription of the six
billion minimum asked for by Secre-
tary McAdoo willicken the German
stomach; an oversubscription will low-
er German morale as much as a St.
Mihiel victory.
