GERMANY IS LOST

Father Cabanel, chaplain of the
"Blue Devils" of France—Knight of
the Legion of Honor, as recognition
for his valorous services—tells of a
Cologne professor, wounded and found
by the French when they fought for
the Chemin Des Dames a year ago.

The Herr Doktor was asked how he
felt, since truthful nations all over
the world were turning against Ger-
many.

"America has come into the war
against you," said Father Cabanel.

The man doubted, reiterated that
such could not possibly be the fact.

"The Americans have no soldiers,"
the German declared. When told that
they had nearly a million on the front
he refused to believe.

Father Cabanel called two Amer-
ican ambulance drivers to affirm his
claim. The lads from America bore
witness to the truth of the Father's
statement.

The German from Cologne crossed
his hands and wept. "If that is true,
Germany is lost," he said.

If America is in the war, Germany
is lost!

America is in the war—and she is
in to stay. Our boys have been mak-
ing themselves felt in Alsace, and
elsewhere along the battle-scarred line
between civilization and barbarism.
