THE SUMMIT OF THE WAR

"We have reached the summit of
the war," said Marshal Foch in a re-
cent interview. "Henceforth it will be
like a ball rolling down hill, which
gathers speed as it goes."

Coming from the one man who
knows more about it than anyone else
in the world, a man who measures his
words and who has it so largely in his
own power to prove them true, this
utterance carries more conviction than
all the arguments of the war critics.
If Foch says it is so, it is so. The
world today has implicit faith in him,
because he has thus far held out no
false hopes, and has invariably per-
formed more than he promised.

The incredible events we are wit-
nessing, then, in these victorious days,
are not accidental. They do not rep-
resent a casual phase of the war, that
will change and pass ash other phases
have. The battles won on all the
fronts are not the swing of a pendu-
lum that is doomed to swing back
again, renewing the doubt and des-
pondency into which the expectant
world has been plunged so often.

There is to be only a steady contin-
uation of the triphammer blows by
which Foch batters now this front,
now that, now another, giving the en-
emy no rest, and leading up to the
grand climax that is destined to come
soon, when all fronts at once will be
overwhelmed in a choral roar of vic-
tory.

Foch will do his part. The army
will do its part. All that is necessary
is for us to do ours, giving our time,
energy and money without stint.

THE TWENTY-FIFTH TIME

It is told of an officer in the signal
corps, taking part in the American
offensive in the Champagne country,
that a telephone line he carried for-
ward to one particular village was
shot down 24 times. In his eager-
ness to keep pace with the advancing
troops, he had tackled the job before
the village was wholly cleared of Ger-
mans.

"What did you do then?" asked the
correspondent to whom he happened to
tell the story—which to him was a
mere detail of the day's events.

"Hell!" was the impatient reply. "I
put up the twenty-fifth line."

Of course he did. Any fool corre-
spondent might have known that. And
it subsequently developed that the rea-
son that line had not gone the way of
its predecessors was, that the signal
man after putting it up had personally
guided a squad of infantrymen to a
German machinegun nearby, and put
it out of business.

Such brave and enduring patience is
the regular thing in the army. How
many of us here at home would quiet-
ly go to work and perform a war job
for the twenty-fifth time?

offer a War Emergency Course of twenty weeks outlined by the
Superintendent of Public Instruction. The course will begin with
each of the terms commencing Nov. 16, 1918; Feb. 8, 1919; and April
12, 1919. The Superintendent of Public Instruction will consider it
equivalent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate
upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for one
year.

This Course will be open to those who have had two years or more of
high school work or its equivalent and who are at least eighteen years
of age.

Old City of Timagd.

Timagd is an ancient Roman city,
forgotten and buried on the slopes of
the Anres mountains. The desert
winds heaped the market places and
ruined streets with shifting sand; the
jackals and birds of prey made the
stately forum, with its crumbling col-
umns, their haunts and hunting
grounds. For centuries Timagd lay de-
serted and forgotten, unvisited except
by occasional wandering caravans.

In recent years, however, the city
has been partially restored and ex-
cavated by French architects and arch-
eologists. The columns of the facade
of the capitol have been re-erected;
the sand cleared from the mosaic floors
of the ruined baths, whose colors are
as fresh and bright as in the old days
of Roman splendor. The arch of Tra-
jan over one of the two main streets
stands as it did in the days of the
great emperor, the founder of the city.
The amphitheater, typically Roman,
held at least 4,000 spectators in the
days when gladiatorial combats were
considered respectable.
