#### STAMPING OUT THE SLAVS

The question of what to do with the Slavs is no question at all to Germans "We must exterminate them!" is the unvarying answer.

Deputy Wichtl, of the German party of Austria, in a recent speech congratulated Germany upon its success up to the present, in having "annihilated Serbia, Montenegro and Russia." The next job would be to stamp out, root and branch, the Slavs of Austria-Hungary. He was cheered.

The speaker looked forward confidently to the time when the Slavs would be wiped off the face of Eastern Europe. "And when that time comes," he concluded, "there will no longer be two states, but only one Great Germany. It will be one big German House, where only German will be spoken, only German ideas thought, and German battles fought. Then we shall wage a new war. We shall deliver three mighty blows by forcing our way to America, subduing the whole Orient, and establishing German power over Japan and China!"

Naturally, one of the steps in accomplishing this German ambition would be to oppose vigorously the formation of Czechoslovak or Jugoslav states.

From the German point of view this is a beautiful dream. But the Slavs have a natural prejudice against being exterminated, root and branch, and wiped off the face of Eastern Europe. And it is quite possible that they may have more than the Germans to say in the final disposition of themselves and their territory. Certainly the neat and effective way in which the Czechoslovaks have been cleaning up large pieces of "annihilated" Russia and restoring it to action against the Hun would seem to argue future success.

And the wisdom of the allied nations in recognizing the Czechoslovak state is convincingly shown by this speech of Herr Wichtl's.

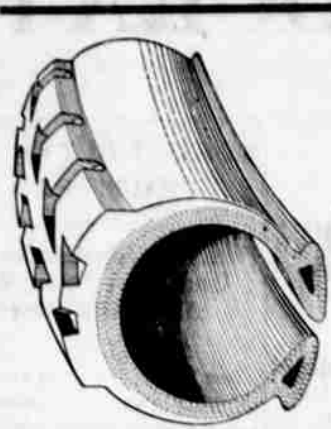
