GOVERNMENT REGULATIONS COVERING CHRISTMAS SHOPPING

Mail and Express Packages

The Government has ruled that all gift packages must be sent before December 5th. The usual Christmas congestions must not be permitted to affect the quick transportation of troops or munitions.

Deliveries of Packages

To conserve manpower and not to divert labor from the War Time Industries, all deliveries must be cut to the minimum. This means that small parcels must be carried at all times and all large ones whenever it is possible.

Gifts That May Be Selected

Christmas shoppers are to bear in mind that this is a War Time Christmas and presents that are useful are to be selected. For the children exception can be made.

No Extra Working Hours for Retail Store Employees

Christmas Shoppers are also advised that the Government has ruled that no extra hours of service shall be rendered by employees of retail stores to care for Christmas business. Shopping must be completed in the regular store hours.

SEASON FOR CHRISTMAS SHOPPING

Retail Stores have been requested by the Government to extend the time usually devoted to Xmas purchases over the period of October, November and December and to cooperate to the fullest extent in the continuance of Christmas business in such form and on such scale and with such methods as are consistent with the Nation's welfare.
