TRIFLES THE BONDS BUY

Guns and shells and airplanes and bombs and ships and bayonets all cost money, and lots of it. A few other items of government expenditure for war business, classed among the smaller items, are sufficiently different and picturesque to add considerably to one's satisfaction in his most recent Liberty Bond subscription.

The war department has spent \$2,500,000 for shovels; \$224,900 for blacksmith, and \$2,700,000 for carpenter tools; \$6,000,000 for axes; and \$47,000,000 for rolling kitchens.

Other smaller expenditures are \$37,000,000 for wagons and carts; \$39,000,000 for horses and mules; \$62,000,000 for food for them; and \$29,000,000 for harness.

Uncle Sam's grocery bill is rather large, too, containing as it does such items as beans, \$12,000,000; tomatoes, \$9,000,000; flour, \$37,000,000, etc.

Clothing, shoes and blankets are costlier items.

Not all of these purchases depend alone on the money subscribed in Liberty Loans. But every Liberty Bond may buy some of these things. It ought to make the humdrum life of the civilian who stays at home a bit more thrilling. He's in the war like everybody else.

The British and American tanks are said to be very trying to the nerves of their chauffeurs and passengers. But that's nothing to their effect on German nerves.

OUR BULGARIAN RELATIONS

It is now permissible to hazard a guess as to why our government so carefully refrained from declaring war on Bulgaria.

There was a strong popular feeling in this country in favor of such a declaration. Most Americans understood the conscienceless, selfish, cold-blooded way in which Bulgaria had lent herself to the great Teuton conspiracy and done her evil best to help fasten Prussianism upon the world. Bulgaria's ideals were obviously antipodal to ours. And though there was no direct military clash, Bulgarian armies counted against ours just the same.

But the government stood pat and kept on nominally good terms with Bulgaria without giving any satisfactory explanation.

It now appears, as might of course have been inferred, that the administration knew a good deal more about Bulgaria than it thought it wise to divulge. The President has the best facilities in the world for accurate war information. He seems to have chosen deliberately to stand aside and let Bulgarian events take their course, foreseeing the inevitable end.

As matters now stand, Bulgaria is satisfactorily conquered without our having to bother about it, and we are in a fine diplomatic position to help disinterestedly in straightening out the Balkan tangle.

The same reasoning probably applies to our Turkish relations. If we are invited, as we probably shall be, we can step in there, too, without the bitterness that war engenders, and help extend our liberty program to Western Asia.
