Various Kinds of Food.

A bulletin issued by the New York Museum of Natural History stated that one tribe of North American Indians regarded a mixture of pulverized ants, grasshoppers, and locusts, dried in the sun, as a relish. Another tribe preferred grasshoppers and crickets with roasted ants as a variant. Moths, the bulletin added, are a favorite dish in Africa, and lumbermen in Maine are said to enjoy an occasional meal of large black wood ants. The beetle is eaten in Turkey, the Nile valley, Lombardy, Moldavia, Java, Peru, and Valachia, and is said to be very nutritious and fattening. In Central America the eggs of these aquatic bugs are served as "cakes." In Nyassaland a paste of mayflies and mosquitoes is considered a delicacy. The Mexicans manufacture a drink as strong as their pulque by infusing a tiger beetle in alcohol.

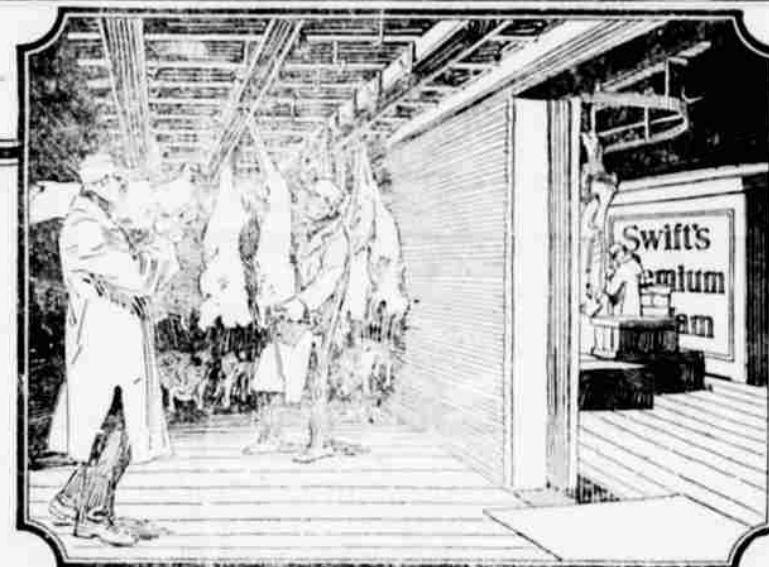
