HE GUESSED WRONG

"After all, what could the United States do if she did enter the war? You are not a nation in the German sense. You have a vast extent of territory, to be sure; and, numbering population as one, would cattle, you have more than we. But what a population! I will tell you what your country is: America is a continent of jelly, full of indissoluble lumps of foreigners."

The speaker was Herr Stresemann, industrialist leader of the Reichstag. He uttered this particular bit of information in the autumn of 1916. Perhaps he has learned his mistake since. But it doesn't particularly matter.

Germans are not speaking so blusteringly of America's softness today. They have found the continent to resemble iron more than jelly. Its people are united, foreigners fight and work beside the nativeborn, and all are fired with indomitable courage and a high purpose to avenge humanity's wrongs; ready to work, to save, to give, to fight and to die for justice and freedom—such is the continent Germany has to contemplate today.

Like his fellow-Germans, Herr Stresemann was mistaken in his early estimate of America's spirit. He is at liberty to change his opinion at any time now. We are not partial in giving demonstrations of our true nature to inhabitants of the Central Empire. Any of them with common sense or understanding may learn the truth for themselves at the battlefield, on the seas or among our civilians at home.
