Of this magnificent total, the last three weeks of September furnished about half. In 20 days from September 10th to 30th, almost as many Germans were captured as during the previous eight weeks.

FIGHTING THE DRUG EVIL

Government officials are confronted by the necessity of combating the drug habit which is rapidly increasing throughout the country as the result of the elimination of intoxicating drink.

A special committee appointed by Secretary McAdoo has made investigations resulting in the compilation of figures which would be alarming, were there no way out.

In the nation there are 1,500,000 addicts to habit-forming drugs, 200,000 of whom are in New York City.

There were 80,000 addicts in the first draft, most of whom were sent back home, and many young men are said to be taking drugs now as a means of escaping the draft.

The temptation to smuggle the drug is great because of the enormous profit.

This curse is plainly affecting the manpower of the nation. The saving grace lies in the fact that the evil is recognized, and already the business of getting it under control is making rapid progress.

Severe legislation, and drastic punishment of illicit vendors of the drug are two avenues of reform. The most hopeful thing about it is the fact that a very large percentage of drug

fiends can be cured. The establishment of proper institutions for the control and cure of the habit would soon result in an army of restored citizens, valuable alike to themselves and to their country.

THEY'RE FINDING OUT

THE AMERICANS, Oct. 12.—The Germans are annoyed by the frequency with which they run into the Americans along the line. The Germans don't understand it.

An American outfit captured a German line officer east of Rheims after his unit with others had been trying to break thru for three days. A French intelligence officer asked the German why the boches failed to break thru. "The reason for the failure," said

the German, "it is the Americans. We are storm troops, our unit. We have been in attacks on three points along the line in a month. Each time we have run into Americans. I have letters from friends along the line. They have all hit or been hit by Americans, who are everywhere."

When asked, the German officer estimated there were 4,000,000 Americans in France.

ITALIAN STAR COMING TO GLOBE IS RATHER LARGE

The wonderful Italian star who will be seen at the Globe on Tuesday and Wednesday, stands seven feet in height, weighs 330 pounds, has a chest circumference of 54 inches and biceps

of 28 inches. His clothes are especially made, and the average man could secure two suits from the material used in Maciste's coat. His shoes are veritable seven league boots and his collar would more than encircle the average mortal's thigh.

As is the case with most giants, the heroic figure of "The Warrior," who is at present upholding the honor of his country in the trenches is goodnatured and easygoing. His enormous strength is never used except for the entertainment of others or in accomplishing herculean tasks for the Italian army.
