PRAISE FOR BANKERS

Says Secretary McAdoo: "My duties as secretary of the treasury, involving as they do the raising of enormous sums of money, have been greatly lightened by the reliance I have come to feel upon the wholesome public spirit of the American banking fraternity."

"With but a few exceptions, they have shown themselves willing and eager to help in distributing the financial burden of the war, which is now being carried with an ease that surprises the world."

The praise is amply deserved, as every citizen familiar with the banks' war-time operations well knows. The handling of the Liberty Loans imposes a tremendous burden on the banks. It is a burden which they have cheerfully and voluntarily assumed. They are doing far more than the government ever asked them to do. Thousands of bankers are giving their time and their banking facilities without recompense, and even paying a large part of their war-loan expenses out of their own pockets.

This should be remembered by the public in its dealings with the banks. You are not doing them a favor when you make your Liberty Bond payments through them. They are doing you a favor in taking care of the payments for you. So are the merchants who cooperate with them. A word of appreciation now and then would make their work easier.

THE WAXWORKS CHANCELLOR

Prince Maximilian, the new German chancellor, seems to be a very likeable fellow. Former Ambassador Gerard says a good word for him personally. By conviction, he is considered a pacifist. Above all, he belongs to Baden, the fourth state of Germany, which is incomparably more civilized than Prussia.

All this, however, is not saying that the prince will prove acceptable to Germany or to the allies. Fine manners do not make a statesman. According to a French dispatch, the Prince's Paris reputation is such as to suggest that "he must have learned all he knows of statesmanship in all-night cabarets on Montmartre."

Nothing the prince has said or done since he became chancellor seems to reveal him as anything else than another handpicked representative of the Kaiser, willing to do the Kaiser's will.

He prates of democracy, and in the same breath flatters the Hohenzollern dynasty. He talks of electoral reforms without giving any evidence that the words he uses are more than fine phrases. It could hardly be otherwise. How, indeed, could a bred-in-the-bone aristocrat, scion of a royal

family of ancient lineage, be expected to understand modern democracy? He can no more represent the German masses than J. P. Morgan or John D. Rockefeller could represent the American Federation of Labor.

Even if he were fitted by nature and will for the task of democratizing Germany and creating an anti-militarist government acceptable to the allies, the odds are too heavy against him. The German political system automatically prevents any change or reform to which the Kaiser does not consent. There is no indication that Wilhelm's heart or purpose has changed. Maximilian therefore cannot register any change of importance. He may flatter and please the Reichstag, but the Reichstag is only a debating society.

Maximilian is obviously enough mere window-dressing, a wax-work pacifist put forward to fool the Ger-

man and allied public, while behind his peace proposal there are the same old Prussian wars of autocracy, militarism, brutality and deceit.

SESSUE HAYAKAWA, the STAR

At the Globe today: Somewhere, sometime, somebody has designated Sessue Hayakawa, the distinguished Japanese star in Paramount pictures, as the "Edwin Booth of the screen." There are many who will agree, for in every new picture, his histrionic talents manifest themselves in some new and strange revealing as a Nipponese poet of many dynasties anyone expressed his reflections on the phenomena of nature. In "The City of Dim Faces" Hayakawa portrays the role of a young man whose father is Chinese and his mother Caucasian, thereby bringing into strong contrast in his makeup the intellect and subtlety of the Oriental and the power-

strength and physical superiority of the whites. In portrayals of this description, Hayakawa probably has no peer in the field of the silent drama, and his admirable artistry never manifested itself to better advantage in this poetical and tragic story of Chinese life in the romantic as well as aromatic quarter of San Francisco.
