THE WOODEN HORSE

Centuries ago a certain country presented to a carefully propagandized enemy, a beautiful wooden horse, as an emblem of peace and a guaranty of good faith. The enemy, unsuspecting of any trap, and weary of war, accepted the gift and set it up in the public square. Whereupon there burst forth from its sides armed men who pillaged and destroyed and waged a war more dire than any the country had previously known.

Any peace offer from Germany is a wooden horse filled with soldiers.

What she wants is to get her armies, in as undiminished numbers as possible, back to the German borders. If she is successful in this, we shall still have those soldiers to fight, in this war or the next one that she is already planning.

It is the duty of every citizen of the United States to guard against being misled; to back our government with his money, his labor, his speech and his very thoughts, in refusing all insidious offers of a "German peace." Germany has long since forfeited the right to offer anything but reparation to anybody. This is the dominant note in the reply sent by President Wilson yesterday to Germany.

The German Emperor in a letter to von Hertling signs himself, "Always your grateful and well-disposed Wilhelm R. I."

William "well disposed" is a good joke, but William well disposed of, is going to be a better one.

SOLDIER LOGGING CAMPS

The old logging camp of storybook fame has given place to a new one in which cleanliness and order prevail, and in which the loggers work under military discipline and inspection.

The change has been brought about by the coming of the soldier woods men. When the government determined to employ signal corps men as loggers and millmen, the first step it took was to survey nearly 900 camps and mills. The best features of logging camps suited to a particular section were noted. The defects were studied.

Then construction work was begun on the logging camps for the soldiers. It was borne in mind that such a camp was necessarily of a somewhat temporary nature. Nevertheless, thoroughly sanitary conditions were considered just as necessary for the 100,000 soldier woodsmen as for the men in the more permanent camps.

As a result the larger camps are heated with steam or hot water systems, are lighted by electricity, have shower bath, drying rooms for wet clothing and recreation rooms for the loggers. It is reported that civilian camps have improved along the same lines because of the obvious desirability of the better conditions.

The soldiers work under inspection and are under a discipline only a little less strict than that of the training camps. It may not be so picturesque to read about. But it has taken better equipment, order and health into the camps, and the spruce and fir for airplane and ship construction are coming out of the forests in amounts that mark the change as worth the time and cost.

TO SHOW WOUNDED MEN
WAY TO FIRST RELIEF

PARIS, Oct. 12.—To guide the "walking wounded" back from the front to the first available aid station, the Red Cross is furnishing the army with thousands of small cloth signs.

Medical officers have learned that many wounded suffer great hardships during severe fighting because of their inability to find the nearest dressing station.

In cases men have become lost and wandered about for hours. The Red X markers will be distributed following each advance, and tacked to trees, posts of conspicuous objects by Red Crossers and stretcher bearers. The markers are of white cloth with large Red Cross and arrow to indicate the direction of the nearest dressing station.

Oregon Normal School
War Emergency Course
and Certificate

Owing to the scarcity of teachers the Oregon Normal School will offer a War Emergency Course of twenty weeks outlined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The Course will begin with each of the terms commencing Nov. 16, 1918; Feb. 8, 1919; and April 12, 1919. The Superintendent of Public Instruction will consider it equivalent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for one year. This course will be open to those who have had two years or more of high school work or its equivalent. No age limit is required for entrance, but before a certificate can be issued applicant must be at least eighteen years of age.
