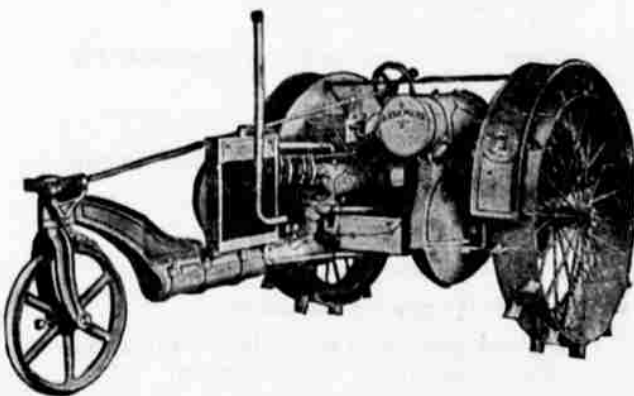

TAX ON HEROISM REMOVED BY FRENCH

PARIS, Oct. 22.—Altho the cost of living continues to soar, the high cost of heroism has taken a slump. Premier Clemenceau issued an order that the state henceforth will bear the cost of the medals conferred upon heroes, and furthermore refund to soldiers money paid since the beginning of the war for their medals. Originally soldiers were charged about \$2 for their medals, then in November, 1917, the price was raised slightly owing to the increased cost of ribbon. Last January the price was boosted again.

Oregon Normal School War Emergency Course and Certificate

Owing to the scarcity of teachers the Oregon Normal School will offer a War Emergency Course of twenty weeks outlined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The Course will begin with each of the terms commencing Nov. 16, 1918; Feb. 8, 1919; and April 12, 1919. The Superintendent of Public Instruction will consider it equivalent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for one year. This course will be open to those who have had two years or more of high school work or its equivalent. No age limit is required for entrance, but before a certificate can be issued applicant must be at least eighteen years of age. All regular courses will be offered as usual.
