FRANK GROVES, LEBANON BOY, WOUNDED IN FACE

Lebanon, Oct. 25.—Frank Groves, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Groves of Lebanon, serving at the front in France, was wounded in action by being struck in the jaw by shrapnel. He is 21 years old and enlisted in March, 1916, in company A, 3d Oregon, served on the Mexican border and was sent to France in December, 1917. Later he was transferred to the 102d infantry. He has been engaged for several months in some of the warmest battles of the Western front. He was a senior in the local high school and a member of the Presbyterian Sunday school, where his name appears on the honor roll of that church.

REMOVE POSTERS, IS PLEA OF LIBERTY LOAN MEN

The county Liberty Loan headquarters makes request of business houses to remove all Liberty posters from display windows. This is in line with the desires of the Treasury Department, Washington, and should be followed. The fourth loan being over and the message of the pictorial sheets having been delivered, it is deemed best to remove posters because the public is likely to become surfeited with the sight and appeal of war messages.

Other war drives for Liberty Bonds and for funds to help the boys who are winning the fight are coming, and the Liberty posters should give way to other advertising matter.

RED CROSS NOTES

The Red Cross needs you. Last year the various clubs planned to come on different days and work. Many of the church aid societies came on special days. This systematic attendance helped materially. The executive board suggests that similar arrangements be made for this winter.

About one-half of the last month's allotment has been completed. Orders from headquarters are to duplicate the allotment this month.

The call for help is to YOU.

The war still continues. The casualties are heavy. The surgical supplies are of primary importance. Why are the mothers and wives and sisters apparently indifferent? The boys

want to come home, but they will not quit their job.

"Many are the hearts that are weary tonight,

Wishing for the war to cease—"

"The Boys" are over there to win. Shall we in Albany fail to keep the home fires burning?

The Red Cross rooms have not been ordered closed as many think, but any one having a cold is asked to wait until well before going to work.

General Petain, commanding the armies of the North and Northeast, has sent the following letter to Major James H. Perkins, vice-president of the National City bank, N. Y., who has resigned as American Red Cross Commissioner for Europe to enter the American army:

"You have given, and I thank you for it with all my heart, numerous

proofs of your affection for the French soldier. He assured that he will cherish deep gratitude towards your great country not only for its powerful and generous cooperation in the struggle against the common enemy but also for the touching attention of the American Red Cross, so charitably and devotedly, has paid to him in a thousand ways."

Relief work by the American Red Cross in Belgium necessitated an expenditure of \$1,432,374 for the ten months ending June 30. This amount went to provide comforts and medical assistance for Belgian soldiers, 90,000 residents of that part of the little country outside the German lines and the scattered 600,000 refugees scattered thru France, England, Holland and Switzerland.

The sum of \$1,947,325 has been appropriated to continue this work during the last six months of this year.

Thus by the end of this year the Red Cross will—since the beginning—have appropriated for use among the Belgians the sum of \$3,379,699. These are the outstanding facts in the current section of the war council report relative to the use being made of the Red Cross war fund.

THIRTEEN DEAD IN CAMP LEWIS
 CAMP LEWIS, Oct. 25.—Influenza continued its downward course yesterday, and so did pneumonia. Yesterday there were 113 new cases of influenza and 28 pneumonia cases. There were 13 deaths. There were 36 fewer admissions to the hospital from all causes than on Wednesday.
