ONE HUNDRED PER CENT
FAIR

Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, once a promi-
nent republican leader and later the
official spokesman for the Progressive
party in the state of Oregon, is more
of a patriot than a partisan. Here is
an editorial from the pen of Dr. Coe
which appeared in the last issue of
the Medical Sentinel. It contains food
for thought for the bitter partisan
critics of the President and is an ex-
ample in patriotism which might be
followed with profit by two illustrious
ex-Presidents of the United States:

"Fortunate indeed was it for this
beloved country of ours that for the
second time Woodrow Wilson was
chosen as our Chief Magistrate.

"First and foremost, he was and is
a man of peace. To keep us out of
war was he elected. By every means
known to the art of diplomacy and by
the practice of patience, weariness to
most countrymen, did his tender heart
and scrupulous conscience long keep
him from the conflict. Again and
again he sought some other way than
by the sword to arbitrate the difficul-
ties which had been forced upon Amer-
ica and the world by unscrupulous
militarists. But the die was not de-
termined between fair-minded men. It
was cast in a hell of selfishness, and
heaven cried out to America. Right,
Liberty and honor were greater than
peace, and, in the end, Wilson was the
world's instrument of justice. Amer-
ica cast the thunderbolt of righteous
retribution. The man of peace loosed
the sword. His other nature—that of
justice—shone.

"We glory in Woodrow Wilson! Not
as a partisan do we glory as we are
not of his political party; but as fel-
low countrymen and lovers of our
great republic and our common coun-
try do we glory in this hero, our great-
est American."

WHAT THE NAVY IS DOING

Because there has been as yet no
great sea battle, it might seem that
our navy, up to date, had placed lit-
tle part in the war.

On the contrary, the increasing roll
of victories on land could never have
been accomplished without the navies,
for to them belongs the credit for the
transportation of men, supplies and
food, failing which those victories
would have been impossible.

The transportation of 2,000,000
American soldiers to France with a
loss of only 300 is in itself a marvel-
ous feat. Moreover, the work of the
American navy was accomplished un-
der the direction of Secretary Daniels,
who was once proclaimed by partisan
republican leaders as an incompetent
official.

We now have 500 ships on duty in
European waters. Our battleships
with those of Great Britain hold the
German fleet bottled in the North Sea.
At Archangel and Vladivostok the big
ships stand on guard, while the de-
stroyers and chasers ride the Atlantic
day and night, hunting the U-boats to
the death.

Man and ship, we are ready at a
moment's notice for offensive or de-
fensive. Should the Germans launch
the threatened winter U-boat drive,
we are prepared.

If, following the traditions of the
sea, the German battleships make a
dash for freedom rather than tamely
surrender, they will not catch us un-
aware. Our navies only wait the
chance once more to prove themselves
a fighting body worthy of their coun-
try's pride.

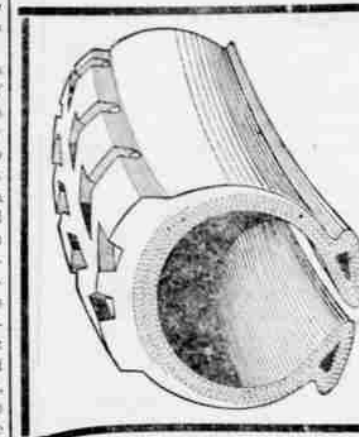
