BIG GUNS

We keep right on outdoing the Ger-
mans in war matters on which they
have particularly prided themselves.
Our latest triumph is in the realm of
heavy artillery. We have in operation
today a large number of pieces more
destructive and more mobile than the
big guns with which Germany sur-
prised the world and battered
down the French and Belgian
forts in the fall of 1914. We have
done the famous 16-centimeter Krupp
and the Austrian Skodas.

These weapons are 16-inch naval
guns designed originally for our new
dreadnaughts and remodeled for land
use. They are described as 66 foot-
long, weighing 100 tons without their
carriages, and able to fire a shell
weighing three-fourths of a ton a dis-
tance of 25 miles with an accuracy
never before attained by a gun any-
where near so big.

The range is not so great as that
of the famous long-distance struts-
gun with which the Germans bombard-
ed Paris; but the caliber is much larger,
and the shell fired is incomparably
more heavy and destructive. The
gun is mounted on a specially built
railroad track, and has an entire train
to itself, carrying the crew, shells and
all necessary supplies. This enables
it to be moved easily and quickly to
any part of the front.

The weapons are now being used to
shell German railway centers and
military supply stations back of the
lines. As our army advances, they
were intended for—blowing up the
forts of Metz and other strongholds
that bar the road to Berlin. They
may soon be most persuasive peace-
makers.

FINAL PREPAREDNESS

The war may be nearly over, as
millions of people believe, but the
war machinery of the nation gives lit-
tle indication of it.

Troops are moving to France prac-
tically the same as they have been for
many months, any slight diminution
in the numbers sent being due to the
flu epidemic and not to deliberate cur-
tailment. Manufacture and transpor-
tation of war material is proceeding
in greater volume than ever. There
is no change in the military training
program.

It has been announced that the war
department intends to call all eligible
selective service men as soon as they
can be classified, and that the United
States is making plans for two years
more of war.

This is as it should be. Few Amer-
icans, whether in public or civil life,
have any idea that the war will ac-
tually last two years more. Most of
us are convinced that it will not last
six months more. But the only safe
way is to prepare for the heaviest
struggle conceivable. There
is no such thing as superfluous pre-
parations. The bigger margin of fight-
ing power we have, the more we shall
shorten the conflict, the smaller will
be our losses and the better terms we
shall be able to impose on the enemy.
